I was present and heard the last evidence. We made a careful examination of the body externally and found it very much emaciated in removing the skin and muscles of the ribs we found a depression of the 6th, 7th and 8th ribs extending back about 1 34 in. The covering of the 4th and 5th ribs was thickened. The covering of the bone of the right side was thickened. We made a careful examination of the head and found no injury. Phthisis or consumption of the lungs was the immediate cause of death.

To the Coroner: External violence would cause the thickening of the ribs, and would be the most probable cause. The depression was so marked anybody would notice it.

To Juror Colpitts: The ribs are elastic in the vicinity of the lungs, they were not loosened from the breast bone; any in-

To Juror Sangster. There is a great deal of elasticity about the ribs in that vicinity. To Mr. Grant I cannot tell if those injuries caused death.

To Juror Colpitts. It would take considerable force to make indeintation of the ribs as they were.

To Foreman Cole: There is no fixing the time as to When those injuries may have oc curred. It may have been congenital.

To Juror McDougall: I saw diseased last fall. Consumption was the immediate cause of death. I saw disease in consequence of attending other patients in the same house, she was faking medicine then and I told her to continue taking it.

To the Coroner: If this indentation was caused by violence, it would cause consumption if the party was predisposed to
