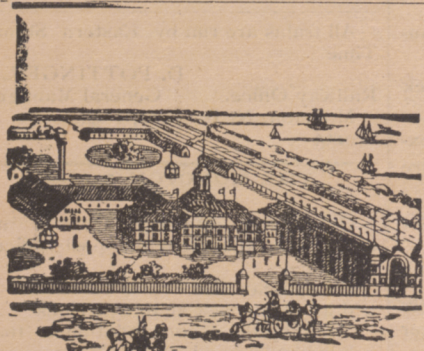

BETSEY PETLEY'S INQUEST.

The inquest on the remains of the late Betsey Petley commenced yesterday morning before Coroner Wortman. Present the commencement of the proceedings lawyer David Grant asked to be allowed to appear in the interests of Wilbur who was present in court.

Dr. J. D. Ross was the first witness sworn: I am a medical doctor practising at the city of Moncton and one of the coroners of the county also. I was notified to attend and make a post mortem examination on the remains of Betsey Petley. I received a summons. I had Dr. Botsford with me he is also a medical practitioner at the city of Moncton. He was summoned as assistant. I was her last attendant on her in her last sickness. I seen her a few days before her death, I have been attending her about a month I in company with Dr. Botsford have made the Post-mortem examination of the remains Post-mortem examination is as follows: We made a careful examination on the right side there is a depression of the 6th 7th and 8th ribs beginning where they are attached to the breast bone extending about 1 1/2 inches outward there is some thickening of the periostina covering the bone on the fourth and fifth rib on the left side about two inches from the breast bone and on the fifth rib on the left side about 1 1/2 inches from the breast bone. We found nothing wrong with the head. A year or more after any ill treatment their would be no evidence of it in the soft parts only the bones would afford any proof unless their had been a cut or tear of the skin then we would have scars. We found no scars, the body was very much emaciated that immediate cause of death was phthisis or consumption

To Foreman E. C. Cole: I found no marks on the left hip or side, I did not make a minute examination. To Mr. Sangster: I examined the head carefully but found nothing.
To Mr. Grant: The marks or depression on the ribs could be caused by outward pressure or violence of any kind. Those depressions may have been natural. The thickening of the covering of the ribs was caused by some violence more than common which caused inflammation at the time. It covered a small part crossing the 4th and 5th ribs on the left side and fifth rib on the right.

To Mr. Cole: I cannot fix any time those bruises may have occurred, as it had become permanent and part of the bone.
To Juror Stewart: I think those injuries might cause a disease of the lungs if there was a predisposition of a weakness that way.
To Coroner: I am not prepared to swear it was the cause of her death. External violence might not have caused the inflammation of the lungs. This thickening is rarely caused by any other than external violence. To Coroner there was nothing to show what the cause of the bruises were I cannot form any idea what those bruises were caused by. Dr. Botsford gave evidence as follows: I am a medical doctor practice in the city of Moncton and assisted Dr. Ross in the examination of the remains of Betsey Petley. I was present and heard the last evidence. We made a careful examination of the body externally and found it very much emaciated in removing the skin and muscles of the ribs we found a depression of the 6th, 7th and 8th ribs extending back about 1 1/2 in. The covering of the 4th and 5th ribs was thickened. The covering of the bone of the right side was thickened. We made a careful examination of the head and found no injury. Phthisis or consumption of the lungs was the immediate cause of death.

To the Coroner: External violence would cause the thickening of the ribs, and would be the most probable cause. The depression was so marked anybody would notice it.
To Juror Colpitts: The ribs are elastic in the vicinity of the lungs, they were not loosened from the breast bone; any injuries to those ribs might cause lung disease if the party was predisposed to lung disease.
To Juror Sangster. There is a great deal of elasticity about the ribs in that vicinity. To Mr. Grant I cannot tell if those injuries caused death.
To Juror Colpitts. It would take considerable force to make indentation of the ribs as they were.
To Foreman Cole: There is no fixing the time as to when those injuries may have occurred. It may have been congenital.
To Juror McDougall: I saw diseased last fall. Consumption was the immediate cause of death. I saw disease in consequence of attending other patients in the same house, she was faking medicine then and I told her to continue taking it.
To the Coroner: If this indentation was caused by violence, it would cause consumption if the party was predisposed to the disease.
To Juror Colpitts: I made no examination of her while living.
William Dempster, sworn, said: I know Betsey Petley; I first seen her twelve months ago last November on Telegraph street; I know nothing of any affairs between her and Lenoard Wilbur excepting what she told me; I seen them together at Mrs. Nelson's; they had some trouble; they were speaking pretty loud; he wanted her to go to bed and drew her into the room by the arm; she did not resist going into the room; all the injury that she complained of was he was hurting her arm when pulling her into the room.

W. McDougall sworn, said: I called at the house where Betsey Petley lived; I received a message from the president of the W. C. T. U. through Marshal Foster; it was in consequence of this message that I attended the house of James Petley, her father; I found Mrs. Atkinson there; at Mrs. Atkinson's request I took a statement from Betsey Petley, previous to her father came to me and told me Betsey wanted me to go up, she wanted to see me. I went up some time that day. I asked her mother what they wanted, she said Betsey wanted to tell me something and wanted it written down. She started to tell me about the same as she had told me afterwards and I told her it was not my business to have anything to do with it. I heard nothing more of it until Mrs. Atkinson sent for me. She then made the statement, I now hold in my hand I read it over to her. The statement was made in the presence of Marshal Foster, Mrs. Atkinson and others Stipendiary Wortman was then sent for. She, Betsey Petley made her mark on the document. I examined her side at her own and Mrs. Atkinson's request. I cannot tell anything about it. I think I felt an indentation in the back of her head.
Adjourned until next Monday for the examination of other witnesses.

DEATH OF A P. E. ISLANDER.

The Vancouver, B. C., World says: At the City hospital on Sunday, 17th inst., the death occurred of James Peake, who had been a citizen of Vancouver for about five years. Mr. Peake was a man of quiet habits and was courteous to a degree. He was the son of a merchant prince and great shipbuilder of Charlottetown, P. E. I. The father at his death left each of his sons half a million and a share in the business. James built himself a fine residence, but beyond that was not extravagant. The failure of a bank in which he was a director swept away a large amount of his money, and the business was manipulated that he was euchered out of his share in that, so that lately he has had to face the hard side of life. His wife; a daughter of ex-Governor Haveland of Prince Edward Island, survives him. She is living in Charlottetown. The cause of death was the rupture of a blood vessel in the brain.
