SERIOUS ASSAULT.

On Friday Stewart Higgins, aged about 35, a son of Alexander Higgins, was violently assaulted on the road near the new school house at Middle Musquodobit, Nova Scotia. The teacher and some of the scholars saw the assault from a distance and say Higgins was struck several blows with a shovel in the hands of another man. When the injured man was found he was unconscious, and Dr. Morris was called. He found that the jaw was broken in two places and the skull was smashed through. Higgins remained unconscious about 30 or 40 hours, and fears are entertained for his recovery. A man named John Millen, aged about 55 years, is suspected to know something of the assault. There has not been good feeling between the two families.

NARROWLY ESCAPED WITH HIS LIFE.

FREDERICTON, June 27.—William Rice, the well-known Lear tapper, who lives at Gibson, opposite this city, fell over the iron bridge about six o'clock last night, and narrowly escaped with his life. He fell a distance of 25 feet on a log, striking on his ribs and hip. He was found about four o'clock this morning in a half dead condition and had he lain much longer he would doubtless have died. The doctor found his ribs badly broken and his hip badly injured if not broken. He was taken to the hospital and may rally.
