> In commending the Post's requirements of true religion, as needed for use on Saturday, it occurs to us to add that the outcome will be safer, and the desired results more surely attainable, by dropping Powell out of his religious meditations altogether. Really Powell might not like very well to be told by an elector that he was going to vote for him as a religious act. Religious acts on polling day are usually omitted from the programme, but we see no objection to the Post's idea of having them instituted, particularly for the present election; only we would suggest, in order to remove possible objection, that the usual order of religious services be so far varied as to have the collection taken up before the other exercises begin. The place for the benediction on Saturday is at the beginning, and not at the end, of the service, as it is on Sunday.
