THE ORDER REVERSED.

Here is a strange story that comes from Montreal, about the last place one would expect to hear of the development of any phase of the woman's rights agitation.

About a week ago somewhat of a sensation was caused by the arrest on a warrant of Mrs. A. Hamilton of Sherbrook street, a lady well-known in society and wife of the ex-librarian of Mechanics' Institute and a prominent business man. The warrant was issued on a complaint laid by an elderly gentleman, named Moon that on several occasions she had caused him annoyance and humiliation by embracing him on public streets. The Judge advised the lady to restrain her predilection for Mr. Moon and fined her \$5. The affair caused a stir in society circles, but this had comparatively blown over when it was revived by the arrest this morning of the lady in question on the complaint of the same Adonis. Judge Desnoyers remanded the lady for eight days.

THE NEW ENGLAND WOMAN.

The typical New England woman, says the Boston Transcript, is the most devoted of mothers, but in that, as in everything else, she is a Martka. The typical American child is very bad, and it is a wonder that so many of them escape hanging before they are 21. The New England child is not bad, though, in the commonly accepted sense, but he is so extremely apt to be preternaturally good that he deserves hanging. He is read to and talked with and prayed over until all the latent priggishness in him is developed, and he becomes a little monster of virtue. The conscientious mother explains everything to him as far as she can, and the child naturally thinks he knows it all. He reasons solemnly between right and wrong, and has convictions on all subjects before he is in his teens. Of course, the great majority get over this in time, but that does not make the system right. There is an unruly age in a boy which is no more wickedness than the sprouting of his mustache. But one often hears the conscience ridden New England mother mourning over these lads as if they were all well started on their way to State's prison. Anything will serve a really good, pious, upright, self-sacrificing New England woman to borrow trouble on, especially if she is well-to-do in the world. If she has a carriage, she can contrive to get more trouble out of that carriage than any other woman could get out of a fire, an epidemic and an execution in the house, all at the same time. What with the physical condition of the horses and the spiritual condition of the coachman, and the awful doubt whether she has taken her poor relatives driving as often as she ought, she can have a regular orgy of doubts and reproaches and questionings over what never was meant to be a trouble at all. Her failings lean to virtue's side, but she will certainly inherit some of the judgments foretold by Dante in regard to those who "wilfully dwell in sadness." If a whole generation of New England women could be born without consciences it would be a blessing—and it would certainly improve their looks immensely.

THE STOPPING OF FAST TRAINS.

When railway roadbeds have been made as nearly perfect as possible, when the lines have been straightened as far as practicable leveled, and when the best types of locomotives and cars have been devised, how fast will steam be able to carry us? An answer to this question, based on a scientific examination of the conditions involved, is furnished by Mr. Theodore N. Ely, an authority on facts relating to railways. One hundred miles an hour is about the limit of speed suggested by him. Another very important question growing out of the first is, Within what distance can a train running 100 miles an hour, or but less than 150 feet in a second, be stopped? The reply is that, under the most favorable circumstances, a distance of nearly half a mile would be required. A train running a mile a minute can be stopped, it is estimated, within a distance of 900 feet. By adding two-thirds to the speed, therefore, the distance required for bringing the train to a standstill would be increased almost three times. It is evident that when we are whirled across the country at the rate of 100 miles an hour "a clear track" will become a far more important thing even than it is to-day.

A CANADIAN PROMOTED.

KINGSTON, Aug. 24.—A cablegram from the War Office in London yesterday announced the appointment of ex-Cadet W. B. Lesslie as instructor in military engineering at the Royal Military College. He is a son of Captain William Lesslie, president of the Collansby Rafting Company, and has been attached to the Royal Engineers for a number of years. He arrived in England yesterday, and will sail for home immediately. This makes the fifth graduate attached to the college staff. Captain Moran, professor of artillery; Captain Tevning, professor in military engineering; Lieut. Lesslie, instructor in military engineering; Captain Cochrane, instructor of surveying, and Captain Wurtele, instructor in drawing and geometry. Lieut. Lesslie was stationed at Ceylon.

A NEW BRITISH BATTLE SHIP.

PORTSMOUTH, Aug. 22.—The new British battle ship, Prince George, was successfully launched this afternoon in the presence of the Duke and Duchess of York, Mr. George J. Goschen, first lord of the admiralty, and a large number of other distinguished persons. The new ship is 390 feet long, extreme breadth is 75 feet and mean draught 27½ feet. Her displacement is 15,000 tons. She will be fitted with twins screws, each driven by an independent set of engines, and her total horse power will be 12,000. The guns which will be carried by the new ship will be much lighter and at the same time of greater penetrating power than any guns hitherto constructed. The Prince George will carry a complement of 757 officers and men.
