ELECTRIC LOCOMOTIVES SUPERIOR TO STEAM.

Comparing the electric with the steam locomotive as mechanisms, pure and simple, there is a wide difference between them as regards simplicity. On the one hand we have an aggregation consisting of boilers, pumps, cylinders, valves piston and connecting rods, with reciprocating motions, while on the other hand the electric locomotive has but a single moving part, the armature, having a rotary motion. It follows that the cost of repairs for a simple mechanism like the electric locomotive would be far below that of the steam locomotive, in proof of which we need only cite the statement of Alexander Siemens, president of the English Institution of Electrical Engineers, that the electric locomotives operating in the London Underground railroad ran 60,000 miles without costing a cent for repairs.—Joseph Wetzel in Scribner.

PLOWING OLD PASTURES.

Dr. D. H. Jenkins, in a lecture before the students of the agricultural college at Burlington, urged very strongly against the practice of plowing old pastures. He would not destroy the turf of old pasture grasses which have proved themselves best able to stand close grazing. The fittest has survived. New seeding will not equal the turf which nature has forced by a long struggle between the good and the bad. If there is a reasonably good number of grass roots, then the position is well taken, and it would seem better to broadcast fertilizers rather than to plow. But if the pasture is largely covered with moss or weeds we should prefer to try plowing.
