

GRAND LODGE OF GOOD TEM

The report of the Grand Secretary, Rev. Mr. Gross, shows a decrease numerically and financially. During the year 28 lodges ceased to send in returns; 5 new lodges were organized, and 12 revived. The number of lodges reporting last year was 114 with a membership of 4,301. The present number is 100 with a membership of 3,675. During the year 1,021 were initiated, 23 admitted by card and 99 reinstated, a total of 1,143. The retirements were 1,769, of whom 874 were by forfeited charter, 459 by suspensions, 145 withdrawals by card and 188 absolute withdrawals, 12 deaths and 91 expulsions.

The financial statement submitted by the Grand Secretary shows the indebtedness last year was \$416.74, and the present indebtedness \$471.89, of which \$183.48 is due Grand Lodge and \$288.41 due W. R. Robinson. Supplies are worth \$44.74; the balance on hand is \$36,49, and the amount due from the lodges is \$68.29-making a total of \$149.52.
