### LOCAL NEWS:

The Quebec express was over an hour late again today.

Bishop Kingdon confirmed a class of twenty in St. George's Church of England Sunday.

A. McKinnon, representing the ready-made clothing firm of Clayton & Sons, Halifax, was in the city yesterday.

Telephone communication was established between Moncton and Hillsboro, distance of fifteen miles, on Saturday.

The joint picnic of the Central and Wesley Memorial Methodist churches took place to-day at Point du Chene. The attendance was very large.

Mr. J. M. Knight, agent for Col. Tucker of St. John, who recently purchased the Enman block, is having it thoroughly renovated, papered and repaired from top to bottom.

E. Elliot is giving great satisfaction to local wheelmen for the skilled manner in which he repairs bicycles. Having all the parts of the standard wheels he is well equipped for this line of work.

Two young ladies while driving down Highfield St. yesterday, had the misfortune to drop the left rein, the horse ran to the foot of the street where it was caught by some people who happened by at the time.

Prof. Andrews gave a very interesting lecture in the hall of the Amherst Academy on Sunday afternoon under the auspices of the Summer School of Science. His subject "The Scientist's God" was treated in an able and convincing manner.

Mr. John A. Brill, president of the Nova Scotia Development Co., on Tuesday, July 2nd, made a contract in England for 25 miles of rails. A contract has also been made with Warren Taylor, of Salisbury, N. B., for sleepers for the same number of miles.

The case of Scott Act against Willard Wilbur, of the Dorchester Hotel, adjourned from last week for second offence was dismissed yesterday by Mr. Justice Cahill, after examining six witnesses for the prosecution. F. A. McCully for the prosecution, F. J. Sweeney for the defence.

A gentleman farmer informs the Charlottetown Patriot that an insect resembling an ant has appeared in a two-acre field of his planted with potatoes, and within a day or two has completely destroyed the potato bugs. This parasite eats the bug, leaving nothing but the shell, and seems to possess an insatiable appetite. The same insect was reported in another section of the Island last year, and no bugs were left where this parasite had visited. It is to be hoped that the potato bug problem is now solved.

### FELL OVER A BRIDGE.

Messrs. Archie Randolph and Fred Winter, of this city, had a miraculous escape from death Sunday. In the afternoon they started to drive to Upper Coverdale and reaching Turtle Creek proceeded to cross the bridge which is in a very shaky condition and admittedly unsafe and is floored with trees not nailed down. The horse they were driving was a spirited young animal and being unaccustomed to such peculiar footing, the trees rolling slightly, jumped against the railing of the bridge, which was so rotten that when the animal came in contact with it, it gave way. The floor tipped up and the horse, buggy and occupants were precipitated a distance of thirty feet into the water beneath, which at the time was fortunately about ten feet deep. The two young men when seen yesterday could not account for their position after the vehicle left the bridge. When they struck the water Mr. Randolph says he was underneath the wagon, which had turned over when it toppled over the bridge. From the place where they fell to the shore was only a few yards and the horse swam dragging the buggy and the young men, who were paddling in the rear, to the shore, where they waded through the mud up the bank, and pursued their journey home. Mr. Winter escaped injury and his companion only sustained a slight cut on the side of his face. The top of the buggy was smashed and the horse badly cut about the legs. Had the accident occurred ten feet either side of where it did one or both of the young men must have been killed or badly injured on a pile of rocks.

### GOLD IN NOVA SCOTIA.

Mr. Libby, of the Brookfield mine, brought to Halifax on Friday a brick of gold weighing 231 ounces, the June crushing of 268 tons of quartz, Mr. J. J. Withrow, of the South-Uniacke mine, brought in 173 ounces from a crushing of 101 tons quartz. Mr. Withrow's mine is coming back to its old standard.
