A letter received from a friend in Lewis & Clarke Co., Montana, announces that a terrific storm raged in that country recently, lasting over 50 hours, and on June 8th, there was over a foot of snow on the level, and in some places it was almost impossible for teams to get through the drifts.—Truro News.

Dr. O. J. McCully has been appointed one of the examiners for physicians about to commence practice in the province. Dr. Thomas Walker, James Christie, J. L. Inch of St. John and Dr. G. E. Coulthard of Fredericton have also been appointed examiners. These appointments are under the regulations of the New Brunswick Medical Council, and Dr. McCully is being congratulated on the honor paid him. The Doctor left for St. John last night where the examinations are being held today.

The school room of the Presbyterian church was well filled last evening to hear Miss Effie Elaine Hext, the charming elocutionist. Her selections were all well taken and received the hearty applause of the audience. The statuesque posing in Greek costume was much admired; the passions, love, hate, etc., being portrayed as if under the usual natural trying circumstances. The vocal selections by Mrs. Daniels and Mrs. Robb were well received.

ARE THEY PROFESSIONAL BEGGARS.

Yesterday afternoon about four o'clock what may be the vanguard of an army of professional beggars arrived in the town with three horses that were, without doubt, the hardest looking specimen of horseflesh that were ever seen. They got as far as the post office when they were apprehended by Secretary MacDougall of the S. P. C. A. A woman who appeared to act as spokesman of the party said their names were Shaw, and they had been living on a farm above Fredericton, that her husband had lately died of consumption and they were wending their way to Liverpool, N. S., her former home. Despite the piteous and tearful appeals to be allowed to go, Mr. MacDougall sent for Mr. Willett, president of the association. They said they were let go through Fredericton and St. John without being molested by the society. After some deliberation it was decided to destroy a large gray horse answering to the suggestive name of "snap" as unfit for further active service. A collection was made up and the sum of \$13.80 was given them. Con. Dunlap kindly donated a large ham and L. Higgins presented the woman with a pair of shoes. The gang consisted of two men, one woman five small children, and a boy of about 18 and a girl of 12 or 14 years of age. They had hardly enough clothing to cover their nakedness, the woman being entirely devoid of footwear. The party left Petitcodiac Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock, the animals being so weak that several rests had to be made in a distance of about two hundred yards.

It is said that two women and two men go through the towns on a begging expedition and meet the teams on the outskirts of the towns, with the proceeds of the tour. Secretary MacDougall in taking "Snap" to his execution, met two women on the back street, belonging to the crowd, they had all the donations they could carry.

The general opinion prevailed that they were the hardest and most object poverty stricken crowd that had ever been seen. They were allowed to depart and started east.

On discovering his loss Mr. Weldon was anxious to have the body disposed of, but found a good deal of difficulty owing to the requirements of law and the rules of the Board of Health. It is rather interesting to hear him tell of the trials and embarrassments he encountered in endeavoring to walk straight and yet get his dead horse disposed of. Really there seems no good reason why such matter should not be thrown off the Petitcodiac river bridge, as it could not do any harm, except in very rare cases, and would make food for the fish.

INSANE MOTHER.

Monday afternoon a South End Halifax woman, whose mind is somewhat deranged, broke several panes of glass in her home, and then took two of her small children down to the umber yard to drown them. Two police officers, however, managed to get hold of the woman before she carried out her threat, and took her to the station. She was removed from there to a city institution for safety, and in the meantime arrangements were made to have her placed in Mount Hope Asylum.
