LOCAL NEWS.

H. A. Powell, M. P. P. was in town yesterday.

Charles E. Knapp, of Dorchester, was in town yesterday.

The merry-go-round was removed to Springhill yesterday.

The Commercial Hotel registered 28 arrivals yesterday.

A. T. LeBlanc comes up this morning for violation of Scott Act.

Mr. Robert Casey is having his three houses on High street painted.

The election of W. C. T. U. officers takes place to-day. A full attendance of members is desired.

Denis Hogan and W. Wallace were each fined \$50 and costs yesterday for violation of Scott Act.

Nehemiah Graves was committed for trial yesterday on the charge of fraudulently selling a note to one Terrace.

Tea students of the Prince of Wales college, Charlottetown, belonging to Quebec, were in the city last night en route home.

Among the Canadians registered at the High Commissioner's office, London, the first week in June were Mrs. R. T. Clinch of St. John; Dr. J. F. Teed, of Dorchester, and Hon. J. W. Longley, of Halifax, and Mrs. Longley.

The June term of the Albert Circuit court opens on Tuesday next, Judge Tuck presiding. The docket will be short, the principal case being Miss Coonan vs. the Albert Southern. It is an action brought by Capt. Coonan, of Albert, for injuries his daughter sustained, when the engine and cars went through the bridge some months ago.

Largely signed petitions from Westmorland county have been forwarded to the minister of Justice, asking for the pardon of Walter and Tuttle Allen, now serving two years each in Dorchester penitentiary. They are from Botsford parish and were found guilty of breaking into a jewelry store last November, and tried under the Speedy trials act, before Judge Wells on December 1st last.

I. C. R. TIME TABLE.

IMPORTANT CHANGES WHICH TOOK PLACE IN TRAINS YESTERDAY.

The I. C. R. summer time table took effect yesterday. A synopsis of the principal changes in which there are some important features will be found as follows:

An express from St. John to Halifax and one from Halifax for Quebec with a St. John connection cross here at one o'clock in the morning.

The Quebec express will arrive here in future at 5 o'clock and leave at 5.20 or 1 1/2 hours earlier than before.

The Pt. du Chene accommodation will now leave here at 1.30 and wait at Pain sec Junction until the C. P. R. arrives from the west. The night freight from the Point will leave here at 2.05, and an evening freight will leave the Point at 18.20 and reach Moncton at 10.40.

The early morning accommodation from the Point will leave there at 6.40 and Shediac at 7.00 reaching here at 7.55.

The C. P. R. from the West leaves here at 16.60 o'clock instead of 16.40, and from the East at 13.05 instead of 13.15.

The evening freight from St. John now comes in at 21.20 instead of 19.30, but there is a later freight and a midnight express train.

The most important change is that the Quebec express, bound north, will leave here 1.16 a. m., instead of 19.45 as hitherto. By this change there is an almost equal division of the time between the C. P. R. and Quebec expresses, and they are not one after the other. The Quebec express leaves Halifax at 18.40.

ANOTHER BRILLIANT NOVA SCOTIAN.

In a recent despatch to the Halifax Herald it was noted that the academy of science in Paris, France, had elected Professor Simon Newcomb, a native of Wallace, N. S., but now of Washington, its foreign associate in place of the late Professor Helmholtz. Professor Newcomb is a son of the late John Newcomb, who taught school at Wallace for many years. John Newcomb married a sister of Rev. John Prince, retired Methodist minister, now living in Moncton, and a daughter of Thos. Prince, one of the pioneer traders of Moncton. Simon was born at Wallace, and when still in his teens commenced the study of medicine with a country doctor who practiced between Moncton and Salisbury. The life of a country doctor was too slow for Simon, however, and he removed to Maryland, where he taught school. It was there that the young man, who has since become eminent in the world of science, addressed a letter to Prof. Henry, of the Smithsonian institute. Prof. Henry saw that his correspondent was a person of more than ordinary intelligence, and requested a personal interview which resulted in Simon Newcomb entering upon the course of study which has made his name famous throughout the world. He has many relatives in this part of New Brunswick, who are pleased to hear of his success.
