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



These are to certify, That the bearer hereof, Joseph Hains, corporal in the aforefaid regiment, and in Lieut Colonel Turnbull's company, hath served honestly and faithfully, for the space of seven years and is hereby difcharged;

He having firft received all juft demands of pay, clothing, &c., from his entering into the faid regiment to the date of his discharge as appears by his receipt underneath.

Given under my hand and the seal of the regiment at St. John's, Nova Scotia, this tenth day of October, 1783.

ACCIDENTALLY KILLED,

FREDERICTON, June 21.- A Montreal paper was received here last night, giving particulars of the accidental killing of a oung man at Orangeville Junction, thirty miles west of Toronto. The item stated that the deceased was unknown, but that a diary was found on his person bearing the name of R. W. Tatterson without any address. There was a young man of that name who formerly lived in Fredericton and whose mother (now Mrs. Matheson) resides on Queen street. Upon the item being shown to Mrs. Matheson she felt certain it was her son who had been killed, for she had received a letter from him recently that he was starting from British Columbia for the east and would be home n a few weeks. Inquiry was made by wire of Orangeville Junction authorities to-day, and information has been received in reply, which leaves little doubt that the unfortunate was Mrs. Matheson's son. He has a wife and child living in this county.

ANOTHER MILL BURNED.

Calamities are gregarious, so somebody once said, and often there seems to be some foundation for the remark. Disastrous fires have been frequent of late and now we have another, particulars of which we find in the St. John Sun of yesterday : At about three-thirty o'clock this morning fire was discovered in Purves' steam saw mill (better known as Stetson's) Carleton, and an alarm was quickly given, and the firemen were soon on the spot, but the flames had complete possession of the building, and the brigade could do little beyond keeping the flames from spreadiner.

A large amount of lumber about the mill caught fire several times, but the, fire men succeeded in saving it.

The lumber in the vininity was saved, but the store house is almost a total wreck.

The mill was known as the old Stetson mill, and was valued at between \$30,000 and \$40,000. There was an insurance of only \$8,000.

The destruction of the mill will be a great loss to the people of Carleton, as employment was given to a large number of persons.

The cause of the fire is unknown.
