PEOPLE STARVING.

DETROIT, Mich., June 13 .- A special to the News from Midland, Mich., says: Twenty-four citizens of Hubbard, heads of families, marched into Midland this norning and besieged the county officials, demanding something to eat. Thirty hubbard families are destitute of food. The people have no market for their wood and tan bark. Hubbard was settled three years ago by Germans from Detroit. The railroad is not running now and the settlers are desperate. The men were fed today and will be further supplied.
