A. Jones formerly of the Windsor hotel, has popped up as the promoter of an extensive mining company in Nova Scotia. This company is styled the Inverness Coal Mining company, and it is said, has secured the possession of the charters of several of the companies, already doing business in the provinces. Under the re-organization that is to take place new and improved machinery will be used. The company, so the promise runs, will make a speciality of establishing its own lines of communication to various coal consuming points, among which are mentioned Halifax, St. John, Quebec, Montreal and Toronto, where the company will own coal yardstead distribute coal to customers.

Premier McKenzie Bowell, with 30 of his followers threatening to desert the moment he proposes remedial legislation, and 30 more announcing their intention of joining the opposition unless it is immediately introduced, can hardly be said to be having a very easy time of it.

ITEMS OF INTEREST.

The revenue derived by the United States from tobacco alone in 1894 was \$28,617,899.62. This amount is \$3,271,813.12 less than the figure for the previous year. The Boston Standard says the burned-up-chew-up and snuffed-up amount of tobacco last year was 244,000,000 pounds, or nearly five pounds for every man woman and child in the country.

The Toronto Globe says: A Kentucky farmer has entered an action for breach of promise against a school teacher, who, he claims, has promised to marry him. The judge holds the view that the man will get full justice from a jury of women, and has summoned a panel for the case. This will be the first instance of a trial by a jury of women, a departure made in the new constitution.

During the past year fifty-five churches were struck by lightning in the United States. This is regarded by some wicked scoffers as an indication that the Lord does not look out for his temples. But this seems to be a depraved view to take. It rather shows that the parish committees do not pay proper attention to the protection of their edifices with lightning rods. It does, however, not leave in the mouths of the Pharisees to put it down as a judgment when an altogether different class of building is struck by the electric fluid.

Greely, the Arctic explorer, probably experienced a wider range of temperature than any other living man. He recorded 66 deg. below zero at Fort Conger, in Lady Franklin bay. On another occasion, in the Maricopa desert of Arizona, his thermometer in the shade ran up to 114. The powder mill operated by Messrs. Roberts, Reese & Bedea at Shenandoah Pa., containing fourteen hundred kegs of the explosive, blew up on Saturday night. The explosion demolished the buildings, shook the valley for fifty miles and caused a loss of \$40,000. It is supposed to have been touched off by an incendiary. No lives were lost so far as known.

MR. COTTLE'S KIDNAPING.

HE WISHED FOR RANSOM IN BUFFALO.

Buffalo, June 29.—Octavius O. Cottle, the well-known lawyer, of this city, was kidnaped on Monday morning. He was lured to a vacant house at 36 Baynes street, where he was overpowered by two men, who bound and gagged him, and, at the points of revolvers and daggers, compelled him to write a letter to his wife, directing her to deliver over \$2,500 to a messenger to secure his liberation. As Mrs. Cottle was arranging to carry out instructions she was advised not to do so inasmuch the captive was kept chained in the cellar, with one of the daring crooks on guard over him. The fellow went away on Tuesday afternoon, and after several hours of persistent, desperate labor, the lawyer managed to break his chains.

Early yesterday morning he succeeded in attracting the attention of a policeman. Then after forty hours imprisonment in a dingy underground room without food or sleep, he regained his liberty. The abductors names are said to be Emery and George Allen, and they are now believed to be in Canada.
