IN THE HARE'.

THE SLAVE IS SUBMISSIVE AND OBEDIENT TO HER LORD AND MASTER.

For the service of the harem, as at present constituted, slaves are indispens able, it being unlawful for a free Moslem woman to appear unveiled before any man s the property of her master or mistress, no such restriction attaches so far as they are concerned. Since the abolition of the public slave market the private trade in slaves has become much more general and widely spread than it formerly was, and is carried on to a great extent by ladies of rank, some of whom are themselves eman-

In addition to the negresses and other romen of unattractive exterior, to whom the menial duties of the household are assigned, these lady dealers pay large sums for pretty children of from 4 to 10 years of age, who are carefully trained or the higher positions they will probably be called upon to occupy. Many Turks prefer, for various reasons, to marry women who have been brought up slaves. Marriage with a free woman is, indeed, a very expensive matter for a young bridegroom and his parents owing to the lavish outlay in presents and entertainments required by stom on such occasions. Consequently if a father cannot afford to marry his so to a maiden of his own rank, he purchases for him a slave girl who has been educated in some great lady's harem and no expense is incurred beyond the purchase money.

A slave, having no position of her own submissive and obedient to and anxiou to please her lord and master, has no roublesome pretensions of caprices and no nterfering relatives to take her par against him- A free woman, on the other hand, is by no means always disposed to have, according to her own expression 'neither mouth nor tongue." She is fully aware of her rights and inclined to assert them, and the moral support afforded by her family gives her an assurance which the husband often finds extremely inconvenient. -Nineteenth Century.

THREE HALIFAX TOUGHS HELD AT TRURG -CONFESSION OF ONE.

A telephone to the police from Truro his morning says that three of the tramps arrested there yesterday belong to Halifax. They are three of the gang that left Halifax recently. One of them confessed this morning that the gang, including four others not captured, had completed arrangements to burglarize several places in Truro, including the post office and some of the largest business places. The "attack" on Truro was to have been made between 1 and 2 o'clock to-morrow morning. The man who made the confession hails from Pictou. He was in Halifax six weeks. He is an ex-convict. The two others arrested were Aikens and Lawlor. Lawlor's people reside in Halifax. Aikens is an ex-convict, and is well known o the Halifax police. His native place is Yarmouth. Four of the gang escaped; their names are Fox, White, Walsh and The latter's correct name is Scanlan. He is a brother of Scanlan who shot Clarence Fleming on Albemarie treet. Walsh, known as "Commercial Walsh," alias "Tatters," has spent half of his life in prison. Fox and White are also ex-convicts. The confession of the Pictou nan implicates the whole gang. It furthr shows that the gang had decided to uit Truro the morning of the burglary and reappear again on the Dominion Atlantic line, to resume operations there, and then jump back to Pictou county, and then to Antigonish.—Halifax Mail.

After stating that the post would not be abandoned, but simply modified, Mr. Campbell-Bannerman added that future commanders-in-chief would be subject to the ordinary rules affecting other staff appointments, and the office would be tenable for the usual terms of years, capable of extension. Continuing, ne said that the commander-in-chief will be the principal military adviser of the ecretary of state for war, and with the adjutant general, the quartermaster general, the director of artillery and the inspector of forts, each being personally re-

The two robbers hurriedly filled the front part of the safe with powder and touched it off, blowing the safe to pieces and scattering the silver all over the place. The packages of bills were all wrapped up in page. and for that reason were not in reaci Just as he was within a foot of the drawer where it lay, the second robber dealt him several heavy blows on the head with the butt end of his weapon. Johnson sank to the floor unconscious. The robbers, who still wore their masks, then locked the door, as several persons had been attracted thither.
