PAINTED ON A GRAIN OF CORN.

It is said that the smallest piece of painting in the world has recently been executed by a Flemish artist. It is paint ed on the smooth side of a grain of common white corn, and pictures a mill and a niller mounting a stairs with a sack of grain on his back. The mill is represented as standing on a terrace, and near it is a horse and cart, while a group of several peasants are shown in the road near by. The picture is beautifully distinct, every object being 'inished with microscopic fidelity, yet by careful measurement it is shown that the whole painting does not cover a surface of half an inch square.
