### Election Rumours.

Press, both seem deeply interested in our future parliamentary representation and both of them tender the electors a little gratuitous advice, as to what they ought to do. In our first number we declared our political opinion, as a steadfast belief in "Measures, not Men" and, at the risk of being considered presumptive, would urge upon the electors the desirability of adopting some similar motto as their watchword. As a racing man would say: *Let's have a run for our money, don't be contented with a walk over.* If rumour is correct there are now several "Richmonds in the field" and, each one has his friends; to deny these the privilege of voting, is manifestly unfair, and furthermore, it is only by the ballots cast, that the opinions of an electorate can be properly estimated.

It certainly savours of puerility to advocate giving the vacant seat to a former member, as a solatium for past defeat; and, is such a humiliating course that few politicians of independent principle would care to pursue. By all means let us have a contest. Give the electors an opportunity of saying who shall represent them. Give every man a chance to back his favourite; and say at the poll who it shall be, whether it shall be E. S. Gilmore, Dr. Atkinson, or the "dark horse" about to be entered for the race, as a government candidate. We hope to see a good fair fight, free from personal rancour; conducted on manly, straightforward and honest principles; and, as we used to say in the palmy days of the Prize Ring, "May the best man win."
