

BOOK REVIEW.

Life and Times of the Hon. Joseph Howe—By Geo. E. Fenety, Progress Office—376 Pages.

We have been kindly presented with this work by its venerable author and find in it much to interest and instruct. The story of the life of one of the greatest Canadian democrats is here told by an old friend and colleague in all honesty and candor—his virtues (which were many) given due need of praise without any attempt at flattery, and his faults (which were few) in no way attempted to be condoned or covered up. Much light is thrown on that crucial period of our history 1837 which nearly terminated in complete independence for Quebec and Ontario under Papineau and McKenzie and resulted a few years later through the efforts of Lord Durham in the Upper Provinces and Howe and Fisher and Wilmot in the Lower Provinces in freeing us from the yoke at "The Family Compact" and giving us comparatively free institutions.

That the author is not averse to Canadian Independence is evidenced in the following:—After going on to show the utter impracticability of Imperial Federation he says * * * "But the independence of Canada must come in time according to precedent, the common nature of things and the accretion of population. The Kingdom of Prussia had long been a nation before 1806, when the population, overrun by Napoleon, was less than four millions—the population of the United States when her independence was declared, was only three millions—the same may be said separately of half a dozen European principalities. So that Canada with its five millions to-day and the prospective millions fast coming along, according to Howe, and, of the old confederate, promises of twenty millions in twenty years furnish almost absolute data that "cause and effect" are as applicable to Canada in this matter as to other countries, Do the Federationists mean to say that a population of twenty millions even twelve can be kept as a mere *Colony*,

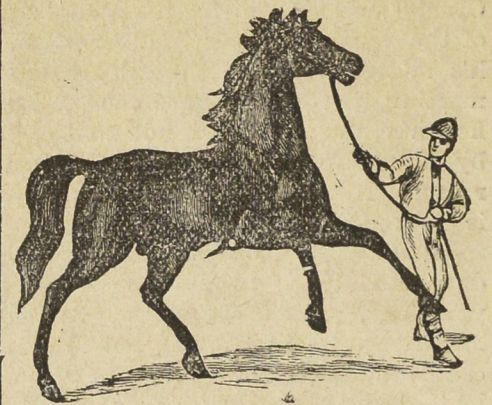
