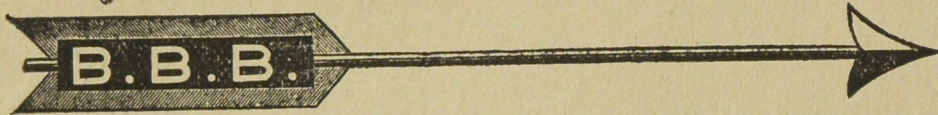


STRAIGHT AS AN ARROW
