Hewitson and Patrick Doohan will sit side by side, and the harp of Ireland will lovingly flaunt its folds along-side with the "skull and cross bones" of the Black Knights, from the highest pinnacle of the staff surmounting the stately building of John Donahoe, known as the "Rising Sun," for it is at Carlow that this great conciliatory gathering is to be held.

Cassidy will be captain and "Poor Jack" mate. It will be propelled by twenty-four oarsmen, twelve of whom will row, relieving each crew every two hours. The Indians, Gabe and Sacoby, will proceed ahead in canoes to remove all obstructions, such as rocks, sand bars, fallen trees and other debris.
