Many the hand, when I reached out the money to pay for a meal or a night's lodging and perhaps more than I had made out of my sales during the day, would push me back, firmly, but gently while the voice of its owner would say: No, indeed! I am a Christian, and believe in the doctrines of Christ, of which Charity to the poor and hospitality to the homeless stranger are the most prominent; and if I wasn't I should everlastingly hate myself if I, doing a fair business, or a man with a good arm as the case might be; robust and with all my limbs should be mean enough to charge YOU for a few petty meals or the making up of a bed.

Others were not so kind however but insisted on their pound of flesh. I have known men who had properties worth five and ten thousand dollars who would ask me to dinner, then fumble in my little stock, of not over 10 or 15 dollars and take out the worth of 25 cts. for the meal, but fortunately such cases were rare.
