Canadian Socialist Notes.

A convention of Ontario Socialists, called by Toronto Local, Socialist Party, met in Toronto last Thanksgiving Day, Oct. 26th. As a result Hamilton Socialist League (Secretary, Alex. Boyd, 736 King Street East, Hamilton) affiliated with the S. P. of C. last month. Several other of the independent leagues are about to do likewise.

The S. P. of C. organized by the B. C. S P. on January 1st, 1905, has now, besides a large number of locals in B. C., locals in Dawson City, Y. T., Edmonton and Claresholm, Alta, Toronto, Hamilton, Montreal, Fredericton and Winnipeg.

Besides the Sociolist Leagues of Ontario, there are the Socialist Labor party sections of Vancover, London, Toronto, Montreal, etc., and the strong Socialist Clubs of Glace Bay (secretary, Wilberforce McLeod), and Sydney Mines (secretary, John W. Taylor). F. N. Lighter, D. N. Brodie, Alex. Mc-Kinnon and others of Glace Bay wers the pioneers of Socialism in Cape Breton, and now all the mining districts of Nova Scotia are honeycymbed with that doctrine. In those districts will be the storm centre of the industrial and political battle in Eastern Canada.

P. F. Lawson, an enthusiastic young Socialist, resigned the editorship of the Provincial Workmen's Association's organ in Glace Bay on Oct. 31st. and on the 27th ult. left for Chicago, where he will enter upon organization work for the Industrial Workers of the World. On his way he is visiting all places along his route where prominent Socialists dwell and consulting with them on the merent situation, which is every where becoming more encouraging.

The I. W. W., whose aim is to unite all workers into "Industrial" rather than "craft' unior, was organized at Chicago last July by the leaders of the two U.S. socialist parties and representatives of the American Labor Union and smaller unions. It demands for the worker the full product of his toil. It organizes all classes of workers in any way connected with an industry into one union only; whereas the American Federation of Labor and other craft unions are merely autonomous federations of union consisting of men employed in branches of an industry. When one section of the A. F. of L. strike other workers of different parts of same industry remain at work, and the small bodies have been beaten one by one by the corporations. The industrialists are so socialistic that the Socialistic Trade and Labor Alliance helped to organize the I. W. W. and is now incorporated with it.

The New York "Worders" report that there was a Socialist Club in Grandmanan was incorrect, although there are many Socialists on that island and Campo Bello.

The failure of the Longshoremen's strike in St. John will direct their at tention to the absolute necessity of political action. There is talk of a Labor party in St. John in the near future. An ordinary labor prrty will give little relief, and then Socialism will have a chance to demonstrate its value as a remedy for the ills of the body politic.
