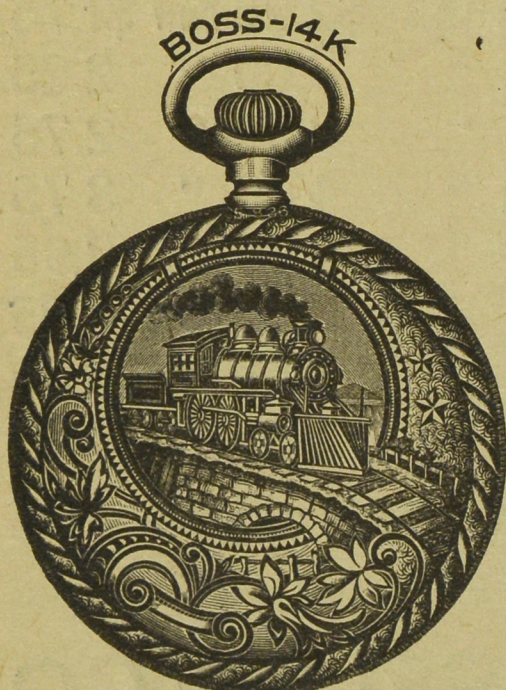

CITY AND COUNTRY.

What Goes on Within Range of the Editor's Eye and Ear.

Have the authorities found out the parties who fired the shots yet? If they have, they have kept their identity a secret. They certainly must belong to the privileged class or they would not be treated with such leniency.

The subservency and sycophancy of some people is appalling. The idea of lawyers, who ought to have some backbone and self-respect, petitioning the judges to allow them to address them as "Your Lordship." Who are the judges, that they should be considered lords? One of them we knew to be a criminal, and we doubt not that there are more, both in Canada and the United States.

The attempt of "The Lord's Day Alliance" to force upon the people of Canada a Puritan Sabbath ought to fail. No man or class of men have a right to dictate to any one how he or she should spend Sunday, provided they do not coerce any one into working against their will. If this blow to personal freedom is allowed to become law, others more stringent will follow, and we will be forced to order our lives according to beauracatic rules as they have to in Germany and Russia. Whosoever tries to restrict personal rights in so far as they do not interfere with the welfare of the community in general is sowing the seeds of anarchy and revolution.

At last a Scott Act Inspector has been appointed in York. We will

watch carefully and see what he inspects. We have never heard of the office being productive of any good in any other county or abating by one glass the amount of liquor sold, but of course the salary will be a benefit to the appointee.

The Rev. Mr. McKim of St. John puts it very mildly in thus referring to the Preston case:

"Some one has broken the sixth commandment, some one has murdered the girl. Two men are arrested on the charge of having brought about her death. One of those men acknowledges that he is partly responsible for that new made grave, but he is acquitted and liberated.

The other man says that he is not responsible for the life destroyed, that he had no part in it, that it was not his hand which committed the double murder by which that woman and her unborn babe were sent to the grave, and this man is believed and he also is acquitted."

Not many years ago a man in this county caught red handed was upon his own evidence sentenced to 10 days in the county jail. Sometimes it is hard to tell which are the worst, judges or juries.

The law that made the Police Magistrate the autocrat of the police force and which has led to many abuses in the past, is about to be repealed and a law placing them under the control of the city officials substituted. This is a move in the right direction.

The suggestion by a writer in The Gleaner that small houses be erected and let to the poor at a reasonable rental is a good one. Year by year poor people have had their rents raised for old-tumble down shacks, unprovided with any modern comforts or conveniences, by greedy, grasping landlords, whose only object was to collect rents. One of them the other day made the statement that if the tax was raised on property on account of the lowering of the poll tax or income tax up will go his rents. "Not one cent will we pay (said he) of the increased cost. Let them take three dollars a year off the poor man's tax and we (property-holders) will put an extra dollar on a month on their rents. By this we will not only recoup ourselves for any additional tax, but realize a handsome profit on the transaction."

That is the way as a rule with the moneyed and propertied class—they grind the faces of the poor into the dust, while they walk around with their hands in their pockets and will not lift the common burdens of the community with even a finger. We heard a cold-blooded remark the other day from a man though poor, who has been brought up in the capitalistic and respect-for-authority school. In answer to our argument in regard to high rents and combine prices for goods he made the remark: "Oh anything is worth what you can get for it."

This doctrine, which is far more common even in Fredericton than the Golden Rule is a beast-of prey doctrine and not as good in many respects as the code of naked savages. It is the doctrine of larceny within the law, as war is murder within the law and unworthy of any man calling himself a human being much less a Christian.
