She established in 1822 a female seminary at Hartford, Conn., where she remained ten years, and in 1838 went to Cincinnati where she was principal in a female seminary, but failing health compelled her to relinquish teaching. She remained deeply interested in educational objects and wrote several books on educational objects.

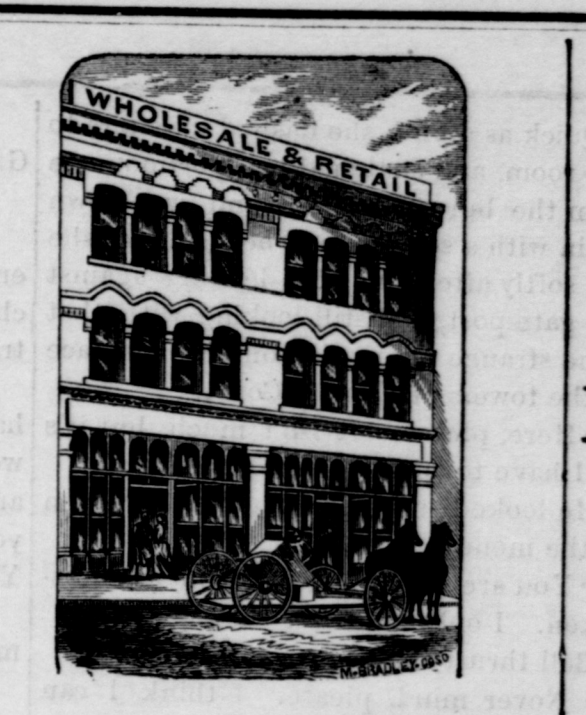
