Whence Manitoba Derives its Name.

Manitoba Lale, which has given name to the I rovince formed out of the Red River region is called after a small island whence, in the stillness of the night, issue strangely sweet, mysterious sounds. The Ojibway Indians who dwell in that neigh borhood believe the island to be the home of Manitoba the Speaking God, and will not land on or approach it for any con sideration, hinking they would desecrate or profane it, and that they would meet with some terrible fate for their impiety The sound is caused, it has been ascertained by the beating of the waves on the large pebbies along the shore. These, with fragments of fine grained, compact limestone that have fallen from the cliffs above, are rubbed together by the action of the water, and give out a tone like that of distant church bells. The natural music is heard when the wind blows from the north, and as it subsides, low, plainble choir, are heard. It has been compared to the chant of the nuns at the Trinita de Monti in Rome, with which all travellers are familiar. The effect is imat night in the vicinity, under the impression that chimes of bells were ringing afar off, add that their tones were rippling over the lake. The mystic bells of Manitoba have acquired such reputation that travellers are never satisfied unless they are heard, and often spend days there waiting for the bowing of the north wind. The Ojibways have a number of poetic legends about their Speak ing God, whom they profoundly revere.-New York Times.

Sound SLEEP.—Sound sleep is essential to good health. It is impossible to restore and recuperate the system exhausted by labour and activity without this perfect repose. Sleep has a great deal to do with the disposition and temper. A sound sleeper is seldom unduly disturbed is apt to be irritable. A great deal has been written about the advantage of curtailing the hours of repose, and of sleeping but little. We are inclined to think that there is room for doubt whether the benefits of closely limiting the time given to rest have not been exaggerated. Active persons of nervous temperament can hardly get too much sleep.
