SEALED TENDERS addressed to the Secretary of Public Works, and endorsed "Tender for Canal and Lock at St. Anne," will be received at this office until the arrival of the Eastern and Western mails on TUESDAY, the 31st DAY OF OCTOBER next, for the construction of a Lock and the formation of approaches to it on the landward side of the present Lock at St. Anne.
A map of the locality, together with plans and specifications of the works to be done, can be seen at this office, and at the Resident Engineer's office, St. Anne, on and after TUESDAY, the 21st DAY OF SEPTEMBER next, at either of which places printed forms of Tender can be obtained. Contractors are required to bear in mind that tenders will not be considered unless accompanied in accordance with the printed forms and—
1. In case of tenders for the construction of the lock, the nature of the occupation and residence of each member of the same, and further, an accepted Bank cheque for the sum of \$200 must accompany the Tender, which sum shall be forfeited if the party tendering declines entering into contract for the works, at the rates and on the terms stated in the offer submitted.
The cheque thus sent in will be returned to the respective parties whose tenders are not accepted.
For the due fulfillment of the contract, satisfactory security will be required by the deposit of money to the amount of \$500 per cent on the basis of the contract; of which the sum sent in with the Tender will be considered a part.
Ninety per cent. only of the progress estimates will be paid until the completion of the work.
Tenders must be accompanied by the actual signatures of two responsible and solvent persons, residents of the Dominion, willing to become sureties for the carrying out of the conditions, as well as the due performance of the works entrusted in the Contract.

I thank you, Gentlemen, for your confidence in the past; I now ask you for a renewal of that confidence; and I hope that my course in dealing with the trust that you will renew it, and make them understand. We have other more deadly foes who are prowling around looking for the Levee and the Fish, and the Wedge of Gold. Drop them. The world will soon roll over them and hold them from our view. I thank you, Gentlemen, for your confidence in the past; I now ask you for a renewal of that confidence; and I hope that my course in dealing with the trust that you will renew it, and make them understand.

I believe that I have acted in the past with a desire to advance your interests. I re-elected I shall endeavor, aided by ten years experience, to do all that I can to promote your general welfare. If on the contrary you decide to elect me, I can only say to you that I will bow to your decision without a protest. I will join with you in asking your representative to fill the responsible office, and I will endeavor to fill the office with a man of ability, and one who will endeavor to do all in his power to advance your interests.
