PAPER BARRELS.—Besides car wheels, and many minor articles, barrels are now and many minor articles, barrels are now being made of paper. They are manufactured of straw pulp, run into a mould made in the shape of one-half a barrel, set vertically. The pulp is reduced to the thickness of three-eighths of an inch, being subject to a powerful hydraulic pressure, and is then put into a steam drier, the sides trimmed evenly, and thoroughly dried. The ends are also made of paper, but are protected by wood. The advantages of these barrels over wooden ones are lightness, cheapness, and the prevention of flour sifting out while in transit. They do not cost more than one-third the price of wood barrels.
