

HORRIBLE ACCIDENT.—We have this week to record one of the most horrible accidents possible to conceive of, by which a boy about sixteen years lost his life in a most fearful manner, on Tuesday last. The lad's name was Kimar, and he lived with his father in Humberton, the accident occurring at Mr. John Deterling's place, in that township. The young fellow, standing on the machine, helping to unwind, when he unfortunately slipped so that his leg was caught by the cylinder. The machine was being driven by ten-horse power at the time, and the unfortunate victim was at once drawn in bodily, being disemboweled and mangled out of all human shape, and horrible to relate, some part of the body actually passed through the machine! Although so badly crushed, life was observable after he was got out, but, of course, only for a few minutes. The conclusion to the machine was so great that the sides of the horse power were actually torn out of the ground. The accident is the most fearful that has ever occurred in the neighborhood, and has sent a thrill of horror to all who beheld it that will never be forgotten, nor should the warning of the necessity of caution be limited to those alone.—*W. H. H. Tribune.*
