

**BATT. RIFLE MATCH.**—An interesting feature of the sports on Wednesday last, was the grand rifle match between teams of five men from the 8th Regt. Cavalry, Kings, N. B. Engineers, St. John, and the 71st Batt. of this County. Although it was not generally known that such a match would take place, and the weather being unfavorable to visitors, the riflemen were not honored with so large a number of spectators as might have been wished for, and the occasion demanded. As we have said the day was quite unlit for shooting, but some remarkable scoring was made, notably that of Sgt. S. A. and Pinder, who totalled 90 and 88 points, respectively, the former being the highest ever gained by a marksman in the Province. The competition was keen and spirited throughout, and the unlucky "outer" supplanted by a "bull" at one shot, may have decided the match either way. Leaving the 200 yards, the score stood: Engineers 161; Cavalry and 71st on a tie with 145 points. The 500 yards was now reached, the 71st passing to the front and going back to the 600 yards with a lead of two points over the Engineers and 13 points over the Cavalry. The 600 yards was fired and the 71st still gained winning the match by four points over the Engineers and 29 points over the Cavalry. The total scores were:—

The very handsome prize was presented to the winning team on Thursday evening at the Exhibition Palace by His Honor the Lieut. Governor. Col. Mausel who takes a great interest in rifle shooting, made a short speech, in which he highly complimented the 71st Batt. in possessing such good marksmen as to be able to meet all comers with the rifle. Col. Marsh and a number of the 71st officers were in attendance at the presentation.

**EMIGRATION FROM LIVERPOOL.**—The returns prepared by the Government emigration officers at Liverpool show that during the month of August 9,495 persons left the Mersey as emigrants, the largest number in any month this year, except May, when 9,880 sailed. The largest proportion, viz., 7,684 proceeded to the United States, while 1,841 went to British North America and 63 to Australia. The remainder sailed to South America, the East and West Indies, China, America, and the west coast of Africa. The nationalities of the emigrants were—English 5,834; Scotch, 114; Irish, 790; and foreign 2,001. Of 670 the nationalities were not denoted. The returns show an increase of 2,229 over those for August last year. The total number of emigrants from the Mersey during the present year, up to the end of last month, is 45,355.
