give (not to take the extremest view) only one representative to a large County of Westmoreland for 15,000 inhabitants, and to a small County like Restrgouche one for every 3,000. The people would never consent to such injustice. In view of the abolishment of the Legislative Council, it was argued that the number of members should be in-creased instead of reduced, and that it would be an anomoly to have a Government of nine, in a house of twenty-nine members, it would give them too much influence. A number of objections was raised to the Bill. Some of the members did not treat it serio sly. On the other hand Mr. Wedderburn, while allowing that the Bill was faulty in detail, said that the object it sought to accomplish was worthy the serious cousideration of the House. Sooner or later they would have to confront it. Finally progress was reported.

Business men have been taking most careful measures for the prevention of a rise in the price of any of our commodities. They expect an increase in the tariff as the first instalment of the National Policy, and many of them, auxious to make a little money by anticipating that, have imported dutiable goods enough to make an increase in Custom duties of about two hundred thousand dollars for January of this year, as against January of last year, and the duty collected this menth is expected to exceed by three hundred thousand dollars that of the corresponding month of last year. All of which means that although the tariff may be higher, merchants will have to sell at a low figure to get rid of their enormous stocks. The result is a foregone conclusion—more disasters in trade, and more bankrupts. The Premier must have seen it coming and given orders to great anybody's application for an assigneeship. THE MANUFACTURE OF GLASS IN PITTS-BURG.—Pittsburg, Pa., prrduces more than half the glass made in the United States. Its factories number 73, with 690 pots, and give employment to 5,248 hands, whose wages approach \$3,000,000 a year. The materials employed in the manufacture were, the past year, 12,110 tons soda ash, 48,340 tons of sand, 152,000 bushels of lime, 1,218 tons nitrate soda, 793,500 bushels of coke, 4,-525,760 bushels of coke, 4,-525,760 bushels of coal, 4,025 cords wood, 6,055 tons of straw, 2,760 barrels of salt, 250 tons pearl ash, 370 tons of lead, 150,000 fire brick, 2,955 tons of German clay. The packing boxes cost \$484,250, and required 2,109 kegs of nails. 96 wagons and 130 horses were employed in hauting. The space occupied by the buildings is equal to 208 acres, and the capital in buildings, machinery, and grounds is, in round numbers, \$3,500,000. The business produces about \$7,000,000 a
