

Robbing the Sultan of Morocco.

One of the richest storehouses of rarities in the world is the famous treasury of the Sultan of Morocco in Fez. It was founded in the year 815 by Edris Ben Edris, who was also the founder of the city. During the middle ages Fez, then the capital of the kingdom of Morocco, was one of the most splendid and populous Mohammedan cities in the world, and, though it declined after the removal of the Sultans to Morocco, it is still a place of great importance, containing 100 mosques, and ranking with the Western Arabs as their specially Holy City. Almost every Sultan has added to the treasures of the Royal Museum, which contains magnificent spoils from the various Christian armies and territories which have been vanquished or ransomed by the Mohammedan conquerors. A great mass of the enormous treasures accumulated by the Moors during their dominion in Spain were transported to Fez and are preserved in its Royal Museum. The sword of Ferdinand, the Catholic, set with precious jewels, is said to be included among the rarities. The treasure-chamber has always been guarded with jealous care, and travellers who have been admitted to a sight of it assert that there are no less than 2,000 keys. A Tunis journal reports that Sultan Sidk Hassan, who is a great sufferer from the gout, intrusted the 2,000 keys to the keeping of one of his brothers, Prince Muley Abbas, who, in 1870, not receiving the charge, made it over to the Governor of Fez, who in turn the Sultan received from one of his vassals a handsome revolver, set with gold and precious stones, as a present, and the valuable keys were immediately transferred to the Governor's chamber. When the place was opened and the inventory revised it was discovered that some of the chests and closets had been broken open and completely emptied of their precious contents. The chests which immediately became the rule in the palace led to no satisfactory result, and the Sultan, broken down among the millions, as they do in France. Two-thirds of the soil of England and Wales is owned by 10,000 persons; two-thirds of Scotland is owned by 300 persons, and two-thirds of Ireland is owned by 1,042 persons. All this our great Free Trader would change. He thunders out his challenge: Let us have the enquiry wide and honest. Let us look this great species which you are afraid of, in the face. You cannot escape from it, and if you meet it boldly it may prove to be, perhaps, no more than a spectre. At least let us break down the monopoly that has banished so much of your labour from your fields, and that has impoverished so much of the labour which has remained. On the ruins of that monopoly, when you have broken it down, there will arise a fairer fabric, and though it is not possible that I shall live to see it, yet the time will come when you will have a million homes of comfort and independence throughout the land of England, and will attest forever the wisdom and blessedness of the new policy you have adopted.

As Accomplished Swindler.—In 1870 an eminent London merchant received a letter from a valued correspondent in Hamburg appraising him that he had been victimized to the extent of \$10,000 by a young man whom he exactly described. He requested his friend to look out for him, and what he knew as the "Dutch Walk" of the Royal Exchange, and in a few days he "spotted" him, made his acquaintance, and asked him to dine. Dinner concluded, the host asked him, and the offence was candidly admitted. Asked to restore the money, he said he could not return it, inasmuch as he had spent some, but he took out a bundle of notes and placed them in the merchant's hand. The latter then told him that his Hamburg correspondent, the most generous of men, had instructed him, in event of the offender's refusal to be paid, to pay the amount, and he could in the way of restitution, to give him a cheque for £500, as he was a relative, and he desired to give him one more chance; and therefore handed him a cheque for that amount. When the next day he paid in the young man's restored notes, the banker said they were unmistakably forged; but the merchant found that the penitent youth had cashed the cheque at the valued correspondent at Hamburg telegraphed utter ignorance of the whole business.

The weary newspaper reader will doubtless be thankful during these dog days for a succinct account of the troubles that have afflicted South American republics in preference to columns evaded by telegraph. In February, 1875, Bolivia passed a law imposing upon the import of nitrate from Chile a duty of ten cents per quintal. Chile declared this was a violation of the treaty of 1874. The Bolivian Government suspended the operation of the law for a short period, but renegeing its promise in December last, Chile occupied the territory between the twenty-third and twenty-fourth degrees. Bolivia thereupon offered to refer the matter to Peru, and the proposal was accepted. That Government ordered Chile to evacuate Antofagasta, which she refused to do. Chile thereupon declared war upon Bolivia, and at the same time Peru declared that it was bound by secret treaty to support Bolivia, and military forces are still watching each other.

The condition of the Albert Memorial in Kensington Gardens, London, is causing anxiety. The marble has been sensibly affected by the atmosphere, and the statues forming the fresco have the appearance of being sculptured from chalk rather than marble. The cause of this is stated to be the acid evolved from the lungs of animals. Scientific men say that if something was not speedily done this splendid monument will rapidly fall into decay. It is suggested that it should undergo a cleansing process similar to Cleopatra's Needle, and then be decorated with a colorless solution which will not only preserve it from further decay but restore the marble to its original condition.

Justice in Russia.—Justice is out of joint in Russia. A school girl in St. Petersburg, not more than fifteen years old, having been the bearer of a letter from one of her teachers to another, was suddenly arrested on account of the Government's having fallen under suspicion. Notwithstanding the exertions of the child's relations she was kept a prisoner and her friends were denied access to her. It may be that this little one will be condemned to exile in Siberia, after sharing the dungeons of common criminals.

The rainfall in London during the first six months of the present year exceeded the average by more than 50 per cent, having been 18.49 inches as against an average of 11.25 inches. The only instances during the past twenty-one years in which the fall of the first half of the year has exceeded 15 inches are 1800, 15.58 inches; 1869, 16.00 inches; 1875, 16.49 inches (53 inches fell in two days). This year the fall is steady and persistent; last year it came in floods.
