The latter then told him that his Hamburg correspondent, the most generous of men, had instructed him, in event of the offender appearing to be penitent and ready to do what he could in the way of restitution, to give him a cheque for £500, as he was a relative, and he desired to give him one more chance; he therefore handed him a cheque for that amount. When the next day he paid in the young man's restored notes, the banker said they were unmistakeably forged; but the merchant found that the penitent youth had cashed the cheque and the valued correspon-dent at Hamburg telegraphed utter ignorance of the whole business.
