A VENTURESOME MURDERER.—There is one murderer who will certainly kill himself if he is allowed to escape often enough. This individual is Asa Broughton, of Albion, New York. Last May the papers contained an account of his crime and of his thrilling escape by crossing the Niagara chasm hand over hand on the single wire that spans the river at Queenstown. He was arrested and taken back to Albion. Last week he again escaped and made straight for the old suspension bridge again. He repeated the perilous feat of crossing the single wire, 150 feet above the boiling current. On Sunday night he was again captured, and will be once more lodged in Albion gaol. If the authorities merely let him escape often enough he will, no doubt, save the State the expense of hanging him. He will do his ton escape once more. TARIFF CHANGES IN EUROPE.-Now that

the new German protective tariff has been formally sanctioned by the Legislature, some curiosity is being manifested respecting the intentions of the German Government in regard to the commercial treaties. The provisional treaty with Austria-Hungary will terminate at the end of the current year, and the treaties with Belgium, Italy and Switzerland will expire at the same time. Only the "most favored nation" treaties, concluded by Germany with England and France, will then remain in force. Against the period in question, Germany, Austria and Italy have advanced their tariffs, and Switzerland has prepared a new tariff, which has not yet become law. Italy has already concluded a treaty with Austria-Hungary. Belgium has yet given no indication of an intention to advance her tariff. The character of the new French tariff is still a matter of uncer-

New Bulgaria has bloomed into a nation. The first Ministry has been constituted after the most approved fashion among western powers, among the portfolios being that of Minister of Education. Already there are two parties in the State, Conservative and Liberal, and the present Ministry is altogether Conservative. Attempts were made to form a Liberal Administration, but they failed. A coalition was then tried, with a similar result. Universal suffrage is the law, every man of twenty-one years of age having the right to vote. The two great questions before the people are the proposed limitation of the freedom of the press and the establishment of a Council of State. It is a significant fact that almost all the deputies who have received their education in Russia, where the censorship is very severe, advocate the entire liberty of the press. The youthful State has made a good beginning in life.

What it is claimed will be the largest ferry boat in the world is now being constructed at San Francisco by the Central Pacific Railroad Company, to plv between Martinez and Benicia. It is to be longer than the great Pacific steamship City of Peakin even, and has a greater breadth of beam than any vessel affoat. Its length is 424 feet, width 116 feet, and wheels 30 feet in dien town it will be appropriate to the state of the state 424 feet, width 116 feet, and wheels 30 feet in diameter, and it will be propelled by steam generated in eight steel boilers, each 28 feet long. The boat is a double-ender, and is steered by four rudders at each end. The hold is divided into 11 water-tight compartments, which will make it impossible to sink her. Four tracks will be placed apon the decks, which will accommodate 48 freight cars or 24 passenger coaches.
