

A remarkable story, says the Wheeling (W. Va.) Register, is told of the late Captain Stone, of Moundsville, who was buried at the beginning of this week. Thirty-five years ago he came from New Orleans to Moundsville to make his home, and there he planted a mahogany-like tree that flourished near his former home. Those he planted, remarking to his family that he would have his coffin made from the tree. One of the seeds died, but the other flourished and grew. From a shoot it became a sapling, and finally in the course of thirty years grew to a fine tree. About eight months ago a severe wind storm passed over Moundsville and Captain Stone found his tree laid prostrate. He had it dried, sawed into lumber, and sent to a Pittsburg firm. In a short time it was returned to him in the form of a beautiful coffin, and for months it was preserved in his residence. About two weeks ago he contracted a sickness that culminated in his death, and his desire fulfilled as he was laid to rest in the coffin he planned 35 years ago, and in which he had been laid away forever.

An international gathering of jurists, statesmen and philanthropists opened its sessions in London on the 11th inst. The object of the promoters is to establish an international code on the great questions which arise between civilized countries. The president is Sir Fitzroy Kelly, Lord Chief Baron of Exchequer, and the judges, by half a dozen English judges. The United States is represented by two Chief Justices and other leading lawyers. France has sent a number of distinguished representatives, as also Italy, Germany, the Netherlands, Russia, Belgium, Austria, Turkey, China and Japan. Among the subjects proposed for discussion are consular jurisdiction in Eastern countries; collisions at sea; international protection of telegraphic communications; international maintenance of light-houses and rules of quarantine; bills of exchange; uniformity of weights and measures; extradition of criminals; sea signals, &c. The main object of the conference, however, is to promote international codification, and to place international arbitration on a recognized footing.

A writer in the Westminster Review for July, advocates Imperial Federation, on the ground that it would strengthen the Empire and save the redundant wealth and population of the Mother Country. From 1815 to 1870, the total number of emigrants who left the United Kingdom was 8,424,942. The destinations were as follows:— United States, 5,877,075; British North America, 1,052,000; Australia, 1,165,228; Other places, 330,639. Thus, while England sent 5,467,075 emigrants to develop and enrich a foreign power, she secured only 2,367,807 for her own colonies, assuming that the other places are British possessions, a taking of the value of these emigrants at \$1,000 apiece, England in that period of sixty-two years presented the United States with the sum of \$5,467,075,000, and the other places with \$330,639,000. The Review advocates a redundant population of the Mother Country to the colonies; and dwells at some length on the resources and area of the Canadian North-West.

A railroad, 2,000 kilometres, or about 1,200 miles in length, piercing to the heart of Sudan, and connecting the Mediterranean with the River Niger, is in contemplation. The compactness of the African continent, the absence of deep gulfs and penetrating seas and inlets, has been the chief protection against successful invasion; but let one such enterprise as this be executed and made profitable, and it will speedily be stabbed in all directions, deeper and deeper, with railroads, which will carry with them the irresistible force of trade and civilization. These will overcome the savage natives and dispel the mystery of Ethiopia. Flooding the Sahara and transforming it into an inland sea may be an impracticable project, but the fact that it has been seriously broached is another indication of the determination of European enterprise to get into the heart of Africa and open it to commerce and industry.

COST OF THE ZULU WAR.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer has submitted an estimate of the cost of the Zulu war. The Chancellor, backed by the authority of the War Office, still adheres to his estimate that the cost of the war will be £2,800,000, and that the month down to the end of July. From that time they consider the expenditure should rapidly diminish, and from July to the end of the year a further sum of £421,000 is given as the estimate. Besides these, the navy incurred half a million of outlay as the cost of transport, and the sum of £500,000 had been put down for contingencies. The total cost of the war is four and a half millions, which one and a half millions were voted in April last; the remaining three millions he proposes to raise by Exchequer bonds. His surplus last year was £1,800,000, and the balance he expects to receive as a contribution from the South African colonies.

Of the railway in Nova Scotia known as the Eastern Extension, the New Glasgow Chronicle says:—The rails are laid for a distance of nearly thirty miles from New Glasgow. Two ballasting trains are now at work, one to the east and one to the west of the ballast pit at Barney's River. The western ballasting train goes to Pictou Landing every morning for a load of rails and takes nine car loads of them, or enough to lay a mile of track. A third train will soon be in operation, and it is expected that the track will be laid and ballasted to Antigonish before the end of this month. We began at South River, east of Antigonish, on Monday last, and it will be seen by advertisement elsewhere that the principal manly work on the eastern division is about to be commenced.

As a measure of protection against the tea dealers who give away china dogs and other crockery to their customers, the crockery dealers are going to give away china dogs to persons who buy crockery from them. This might make a very pretty fight, with the odds on the side of the crockerymen. There are a great many more persons who know pretty crockeryware when they see it than there are who can distinguish good tea from bad. The crockeryman will therefore have a larger margin to work upon, for his "30 cent tea" need not cost him more than 20 cents, and he can afford to be generous.

University of New Brunswick.
THE First Term of the next Academic Year begins on the 21st of September, 1879.
