

The Russian Nihilists keep up their systematic terrorism. On the afternoon of the 25th ult., a young man on horseback fired at General Drevtzin, head of the secret police, with a revolver, as he sat in his carriage. The bullet missed the General, and the assassin rode off into a bye street, where he quit his horse, or fell from it, and took a drusek, or light cab, and drove to the river, where he disappeared in a boat. No man has been found, and it seems indubitable that in the war between the Nihilists and the police the sympathy of the population is with the assassins. It is believed that they are of a high class, and include many much trusted officials, ladies of aristocratic birth. In fact, Nihilists appear to be usually educated men, who resort to assassination because they cannot move the body of the people. They will hardly accomplish much. There are always men ready to be Ministers, and the Romanoffs will probably fall, like the Irish landlords, that their agents are made to show, and perform their duty as well.

The Council of the National Rifle Association have made two rather important notifications in reference to the Wimbledon meeting in July next. The first is that in preference to a strictly amateur competition, the eight inch bullet will be retained. The other is that Martini-Henry rifles being the private property of competitors will, under the usual regulations, be "viewed," etc. but admitted for the competition of the Queen's prize. This last is a great concession. Hitherto competitors have been forbidden the use of weapons to which they were accustomed, and all were put on a footing of equality by novel weapons being served out to them in the camp. The old plan is probably the fairer but the less agreeable to those who happen to possess a weapon of that pattern.
