The Zulu Under Fire. Except when in masses the Zulu is a difficult being to shoot. When on the move he runs as fast as a horse cantering; when halted he either crouches under rocks or lies concealed in the grass. When ready to fire he raises himself, discharges his weapon, and at once falls flat on his face. Until accustomed to these tactics our men are naturally inclined to return the enemy's fire instead of quietly weiting for the instead of inclined to return the enemy's fire instead of quietly waiting for the instant when he rises from his hiding place to aim and fire. Firing at moving objects might be practiced with advantage by marksmen and first-class shots. The best target shots are often indifferent deer stalkers. I have myself seen a Zulu jump up within twenty yards of a company of infantry and half a troop of volunteers, run the gauntlet of their fire for a hundred yards, and escape. Without examining the actual casualties caused by artillery fire, the manner in which the Zulu masses broke up on the bersting of the first shell proves with what dream the fire of our guns is regarded. Indeed, it is quite proverbial. Prisoner's become almost ludicrously excited when questioned as to what they think of the "By-and-bye" (the Caffre name for cannon). "We see them coming through the air," they say, referring to the shells and imitating their hissing noise; "we get out of their way; they pass, strike the ground, then kill—we cannot understand. The rockets, a few of which were fired with the usual unsatisfactory results, are said to have spread greater toward energy the Zulu masks. Major Serpa Pinto, the Portuguese traveller in Africa who recently turned up at Durban, has been lecturing on his travels at Opp. Reform Club Rooms, Queen St. Lisbon. Next interchanging the figures in the number 27, and using 72 as a multiplier, with 987654321 as the multiplicand, we obtain a product of 7111111112—all ones except the first and last figures, which read together gives 72, the multiplier.

Denmark threatens to prove a formidable rival to Canada and the United States in the live stock trade with England. The Scan-dinavian cattle exhibited at the Newcastle wholesale market have represented of late more than two-thirds of the beasts offered for sale. The quality of them may be judged from the fact that considerable sales were made for the soutbern markets, to which none but the best sorts are sent. A quantity of stock is now fed on the best pastures in Denmark for the English markets. When prices are pretty stiff, the Danish cattle steamers, instead of waiting for cargoes of coals or goods, run out of northern ports in ballast, and return with a fresh supply in a marvelously short space of time. In fine weather Copenhagen and the adjacent ports sending cattle to Newcastle are as near to it
