A ROYAL MARRIAGE.

Princess Louise Married at Windsor Castle.

A Description of the Bride's Dress. Sent of Honor Occupied by the Queen.

A cablegram from London, Tuesday, says that shortly after 4 o'clock on Monday amid a scene of splendor and most imposing ceremonies, the Princess Louise second daughter of Prince and Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein, and grand daughter of the Queen of England, was married to Prince Albert of Anhalt in the historic St. George's chapel, Windsor Castle.

The bride's dress was of cream white satin of most exquisite texture. It was bordered with orange blossoms, and the skirt was draped Honiton Duchesse lace, which was designed by the late Prince Consort for the Queen, and which was afterwards worn by the bride's mother, the Princess Christian, just 25 years ago, for the Prince and Princess Christian will celebrate their silver wedding at Cumberland lodge on Wednesday next.

The bride's dress was of cream white satin of most exquisite texture. It was bordered with orange blossoms, and the skirt was draped Honiton Duchesse lace, which was designed by the late Prince Consort for the Queen, and which was afterwards worn by the bride's mother, the Princess Christian, just 25 years ago, for the Prince and Princess Christian will celebrate their silver wedding at Cumberland lodge on Wednesday next.

The ceremony was performed by the Archbishop of Canterbury, and was most simple, the exhortation being very brief. ST. JOHN EXHIBITION.

The Work Being Pushed Rapidly Forward. The Exhibition Promises to be More Attractive Than Ever Before.

St. John is now probably one of the most brilliantly lighted cities in the Dominion (owing in a large measure to the interest created in electrical work by the Electrical Exhibition recently held in that city) there being five of the finest central stations of Electric Light Companies in the city running the Edison, Thomas Houston, Fort Wayne and Brush Electric Light systems.

The streets and side-walks of St. John are being wonderfully improved, asphalt sidewalks being laid in all the main thoroughfares, while the grading of the streets and laying of block pavement from the International Steamship Co's landing to Indianatown, will not only modify the noise of the traffic on the streets, but make it a most delightful drive over this largely frequented thoroughfare, while the effects of the brilliantly lighted and beautifully decorated shop windows along the route, as well as the effect of the street lights, make it particularly attractive for an evening walk or drive.

The streets and side-walks of St. John are being wonderfully improved, asphalt sidewalks being laid in all the main thoroughfares, while the grading of the streets and laying of block pavement from the International Steamship Co's landing to Indianatown, will not only modify the noise of the traffic on the streets, but make it a most delightful drive over this largely frequented thoroughfare, while the effects of the brilliantly lighted and beautifully decorated shop windows along the route, as well as the effect of the street lights, make it particularly attractive for an evening walk or drive.

One of the features which will be particularly attractive to lovers of Art, will be the Art Exhibition and sale which is to be held at Owen's Art Gallery, during time of the Exhibition opening on Sept. 23rd, and closing Oct. 3rd, which combines not only an Art Exhibition, but also of species Art Union, at which at which visitors will be able to purchase some of the best work of the students and others, at reasonable rates. The governors of the Institution have established correspondence throughout Canada, United States, Europe and Australasia, and have the prospect of having one of the best Art Exhibitions ever held in Canada. The names of those connected with this Institution are sufficient guarantee that it will be all that it is represented.

Arrangements are being made with the best musical talent for promenade concerts every afternoon and evening during the term of the Exhibition.

The directors of the great Northern road have declared a regular quarterly dividend 1 1/2 per cent payable August 1.

A statue of Robert Burns was unveiled at Ayr on Wednesday. It was erected under the auspices of the Freemasons.

The funeral of the late ex-president Hamlin took place yesterday at Bangor, Me. The remains were interred in Mt. Hope Cemetery.

An English Judge recently sentenced a woman to five minutes' imprisonment for bigamy. It is probably the shortest sentence on record.

The large four-story building of the Empire Print Works, New York, was burned Tuesday with the stock, machinery, etc. The loss is estimated at \$200,000.

Stephen Daley has been arrested at Hartford, Conn., for killing John P. McCarthy at Trinity college. He is held on charge of murder in the second degree.

The Kanawha and Michigan train, in Charleston, W. Va., went through a thirty foot trestle Saturday. The trestle was burned out, and fifteen killed, 58 injured seriously.

The directors of the Canadian Pacific railroad have declared a semi annual dividend of 1 1/2 per cent from their Canadian annuity, and 1 per cent from earnings, payable August 17.

At Chicago on the 4th a large sky-rocket shot along the sidewalk, and struck John Merrill in the abdomen, passing through his body. He died shortly afterwards in great agony.

The New York morning papers in commenting upon the Sing Sing electrical executions take occasion to strongly condemn Warren Brown for his plans to prevent the newspapers from securing reports of the affair.

A Polish girl only 11 years old, who had travelled alone all the way from Poland, passed through Scranton for Shickshinny, Pa., last week. She could not speak English but a tag on her shoulder told her destination.

The sultan of Zanzibar presided Wednesday at the opening of Cooper's institute. The firing of the guns startled the horses attached to the sultan's carriage and they plunged and reared furiously. The sultan became bewildered and jumped from the carriage, seriously injuring his legs and head.

At Providence, R. I., Robert Farrell engaged in work at Albion in connection with the Albion mill demanded 48 cents as the balance of his wages from John Shea, boss of the gang, and not meeting with ready response fired three times at Shea, one of the balls taking effect in his neck, causing an ugly wound.
