Every week the St. John papers publish the mortuary statistics for the city during the week, under which head all the opening of Mr. Todd's stock farm he has the different diseases of which persons die are placed in single columns; and in the enumeration is one for "Old Age." Now we are anxious to know what Boards of Health mean by old age, when they classify it among the diseases? How is it that infants are not so treated-for there are more who die of (in) infancy than of old age; if the classification is permissible in one case, so it should be in the other? No! We are told that infants die of croup, diphtheria, or some other such disease. Why then say that men die of old age, when there is no such thing to die of except disease, or sudden death if you like; but sudden death is as common to the young as to the old. But take the term in its abstract sense, and we ask when does old age begin-where does the statistician fix the turning point? Ay, when the death just at that point? Now it is well known in physiology that some men are quite old at 60, while others are not old at 70 or 80. What is the standard of old age (that men should die) in such cases? True, the vital powers as age advances become weaker and weaker; and although not so likely to happen in the young, still they also weaken. More persons die at 20 than over that age. When an old man dies it is from some weakness, or running down of the system; but the same with much younger persons. It depends upon the constitution, good or bad, how long a man can live; and, therefore, old age has no more to do with one man's death than death has with another in the infancy of his days. "Died of Old Age" is a contradiction of common sense.
