

It showed a wonderfully high average yield of the dairies in the town. Here is a sample: J. D. Mitchell, 15 registered Jersey. Acres in farm, 105, assessed at \$1,700. Acres in meadow 25, cow, \$18. Value of calves, \$340, viz. 8 at Value of grain bought per cow, \$15; fed 10 months. Ration nearly 5 lbs. per day of corn meal, cottonseed meal and wheat bran. Butter sold, 4,492 lbs. at 25 cents. Deep setting for creaming milk with water at 60° Cost of keep exclusive of pasture per cow, \$34. Total earnings per cow, \$101.14. Twelve calves kept five weeks on whole milk of the herd, and all but two of herd under eight years old.
