DEATH OF THE METROPOLITAN.

The Most Reverend John Medley, D. D., Metropolitan of Canada, died at Bishopscoote on Friday morning at twenty minutes to nine.

The Metropolitan of Canada was an Englishman by birth and education, and was born on the 19th of December, 1804.

In 1845 the Diocese of Fredericton was formed and on the nomination of the Archbishop of Canterbury, John Medley was appointed to that See, and consecrated its first Bishop, on the 4th of May.

The consecration took place at Lambeth Palace. The new Bishop sailed immediately for the new world, and on the 11th June was inducted in the parish church.

Dr. Medley was incapable of the eloquence of a Punshon or a Chapin, but his preaching was higher in tone, and more polished in style.

The Metropolitan was an author of repute. His published writings embrace several volumes of sermons, tracts, etc., besides a small book of Episcopal Forms for Church Government, several lectures, an address to Sunday School Teachers, numerous charges to the clergy, and a fine scholarly work on the Book of Job, with a new translation, notes and an introduction.

The Metropolitan was in his 88th year and up to the last year he has continued to pursue his avocations with his usual spirit and vigor, his age apparently offering no perceptible barrier to the full play of his faculties.

The funeral of the Bishop will take place at 11 o'clock on Tuesday morning from the Cathedral; the remains to be interred in the spot chosen by himself at the east end of the Cathedral.

LAKE TEMISQUATA.

How to get to the lake, and how not to.
