The Most Reverend John Medley, D. D., Metropolitan of Canada, died at Bishopscote on Friday morning at twenty minutes to nine. The death of His Lordship has been looked for for some time. and it was therefore no surprise when the Cathedral bells on Friday morning sent forth their slow and melancholy chimes to announce to the world that passed away from earth.


