

The Dairy.

How to Save Your Butter. John W. Decker, of the Wisconsin agricultural college, says: Suppose a farmer has 250 lbs. of milk a day as the product from his herd: 200 lbs. of this will be skimmlik. If he loses 11 per cent of fat in the skimmilk he will be losing over three pounds of butter per day. Three pounds of butter a day for a week is twenty-one pounds, at twenty-five cents is \$5.25. How long can our farmers afford to lose \$5 a week? Now with a hand separator this great loss of butter in the skim milk can be saved. A cow that produces a pound of butter a day is a good cow, but this machine, that will cost about as much as three good cows, will save as much butter as the cows would produce and has the advantage over them in the fact that the machine does not eat anything. I am an advocate of the hand separator for farmers who make up their milk into butter or send their cream to gathered-cream butter factories. Preprietors of such factories say that they not only get more cream from the same herds, but are able to make more butter out of it. The hand separator is rapidly coming into use in our State, but I want to see its use hastened. But the loss of butter-fat in the way I have described is not the only unnecessary waste occurring among Wisconsin dairymen. You will remember that the product of the cows is milk in its various forms. Butter-fat is not the only constituent of milk. There are also skimmilk and whey that are valuable by Many of the sources of fertilizers contain products. The skimmilk at a great many creameries is taken home sweet and fed fore it has a chance to sour, but not so with the whey at our cheese factories. If the armer buys corn or bran he pays good hard money for it. Sweet whey can be made to worth about eight cents per hundred. Neither animal nor vegetable life could continue were it not for this law of decay, which begins its work in milk as is legal for any householder, from his own soon as it comes in contact with the air. We promises, to throw water upon an organshould strive, therefore, to get the most and grinder who refuses to move on. best we can before the work of this law begins. How necessary, then, that milk should be made from healthy cows fed on pure foods of a proper nature, and that the cows be given plentiful supply of pure, sweet water; that the milk be given proper and constant care during all the changes it experiences from the time it is drawn till we have the product we desire, either cream, butter or cheese. Whereever we look we see the effect of this law death and decay. It is everywhere present supplementing life as it were. We behol it in every flower, in every plant, in every leaf, in every animal, in every being-in everything in nature except the mineral kingdom. It is stern and immutable, but a great and righteous law, and we should all conform to and obey it cheerfully but not invite or give harbor to it. Cleanliness is said fatally to be next to godliness, and if we are to delay the working of this law of decay in the dairy, we must observe and enforce the law of cleanliness.
