#### THE VICTORIA DISASTER.

The collision of the Camperdown and Victoria off Tripoli last week is the most terrible naval disaster in point of number of lives lost that has occurred in a time of peace since the foundering of the Royal George off Spithead.

Fifteen minutes after the Camperdown's ram entered her side the Victoria keeled over and plunged to the bottom in 60 fathoms of water, carrying down with her, Vice Admiral Sir George Tyron and 463 officers and men. In England the receipt of this terrible news caused universal sorrow and suspended all social events. From the Queen down to the meanest subject, all joined in the national grief over the death of so many brave

The Victoria was a twin screw single turret battle ship of the first-class, launched in 1887, her dimensions were length, 340 feet; breadth, 70 feet; draught of water, 27 ft. 3 ins; displacement, 10,-470 tons; indicated horse power, 12,000; speed, 17 knots: She was protected by armour 16 and 18 inches thick and carried two 111 ton guns in a revolving turret, armoured to the extent of 18 inches. In addition to these guns she was armed pounder and nine 3-pounder quick firers, a considerable number of machine gnns, and 9 torpedo dischargers.


