THE LAW COURTS.

A meeting of the St. John Law Society was called to meet in that city on Wednesday night last for the purpose of discussing the advisability of applying to have two sessions of the supreme court held in St. John every year, but owing to the inclemency of the weather, the meeting was adjourned till Tuesday next, when the matter will be taken into consideration. This action is but the outcome of an agitation which has been carried on with more or less persistency for some years past among our neighbours in the commercial metropolises, and which in its original integrity includes the removing of the University, the Normal School, the House of Assembly, the Supreme Court and all the departmental offices as well as government house, and the Episcopal Cathedral to St. John, with a view to concentrating all the social, political, educational, legislative, judicial and ecclesiastical life and functions of the province within an area of about 3 miles on every side of the market square, so that the inhabitants of that loyalist stronghold may be saved the exhaustion involved in a trip to the present capital for any of the purposes above mentioned, and may transact all the affairs of life within easy reach of their general residences. It cannot be said with certainty that the present movement will be attended by such widespread and sweeping consequences as outlined above. It may be even said that, if it is advisable or right for the supreme court to set at two different places alternately, the St. John lawyers may, with every show of reason, claim a right to its presence and attention for half the time. But we are suspicious of the whole movement, and we maintain that the supreme court of the province, the highest purely provincial court of appeal, should, in accordance with the custom and the spirit of the English law always set and administer justice at one and the same place during the entire year. It is the centre of the judicial system of New Brunswick; towards it the eye of every litigant is turned; it controls its more humble and subordinate contemporaries within the bounds of its own jurisdiction; and it is about as constant for it to have a duplicate abiding place as it is for a circle to possess two separate and independent centres. The Supreme Court should set either at one place or the other during the entire judicial year; and we are inclined to think that its present location at Fredericton is much more central and more accessible to all parts of the Province than St. John would be leaving out of consideration the fact that the Supreme Court has always administered justice from the celestial, and has all its records stored in the building adapted and appropriated for that purpose long ago.

MR. FOSTER'S SPEECH.

There was very little worthy of note in the speech made by Hon. Mr. Foster at the banquet in St. John on Thursday night. As might be expected the honorable gentleman touched upon the commercial and industrial status of the Dominion of Canada, and attempted to impress upon his hearers, by detached statements and comparisons, that Canada has since 1878 passed through a period of continued and ever-increasing prosperity, until she now stands in a proud position among the colonies of the Empire, and can boast a financial soundness and credit not exceeded, if it is equalled, by some of the great nations of the earth, and to tell the truth, there did not seem to be a dissenting voice raised against the utterance of such sentiments; but it must be remembered that they were uttered at a place and on an occasion where there were present only the tried and true followers of the old policy, no one of whom would have had the temerity to openly question the semi-official deliverance by the Finance minister, no matter how much he might doubt them in his own mind. It was the chosen opportunity for the glorification of the National Policy, and Mr. Foster went in on that line in very good style. As for the future policy of the government, the minister said that they intended to stick to the N. P. upon principle but would do their best to amend its details

A weekly line of steamers is to be established between Montreal and Belgium. The Kansas law imposing a tax on every man over 21 who does not vote has been declared constitutional in a test case.

The Spanish Government will send three torpedo boats to Cuba, to assist in patrolling the coast against the filibustering expeditions. Miss Fawcett, the young Englishwoman who took in 1890 the "above-the-senior-wrangler," has adopted the profession of an electrical engineer.

The Royal Bank of Queensland, Australia was suspended this week. This makes the thirteenth Australian bank which has failed up to date.

George R. Clark assistant manager of the African Choir Company, was found dead in bed at the Commercial Hotel Woodstock, Ont., the other morning.

A boiler exploded Wednesday in Roberts' cloth factory in Sedan. All hands were at work at the time. Twenty are said to have been killed and many more injured.

Toy Wing Sang, a hustling promoter has succeeded in getting subscriptions of \$14,000,000 from American and Chinese capitalists for building electric roads and lighting plants in Chinese cities.

Cinderella's real name was Rhodope, and she was a beautiful Egyptian maiden who lived 670 years before the common era and during the reign of Psammetichus, one of the twelve kings of Egypt.

L. M. Carrier, commission agent of Quebec, has left the country with \$15,000 entrusted to him by the flour merchants to be paid to western millers. Carrier leaves unpaid debts amounting to \$25,000. Pope Leo is getting very feeble, but he celebrates mass every morning at 6.30, and has to be assisted through the service by two attendants. He ascends and descends the steps of the altar with difficulty.

A despatch from Sofia says:—When the Prince and Princess Ferdinand were received at Tirnova on Monday, the Council presented to the Prince a golden sceptre and to the princess a silver dinner service, and the Mussulmans gave a rich carpet to the royal pair.

A man from Quebec, saying that an Indian has arrived at River St. Margaret from the Interior who has supported himself during the winter on the bodies of his family. The coroner has gone to enquire into the matter.

The Ontario Coal Company assigned Monday. The Molson Bank is the principal creditor, the amount of paper held by it being between \$250,000 and \$400,000. The Ontario Bank is interested to the extent of over \$100,000.

The Earl of Dysart, a Scottish peer, said in an interview at Chicago recently that he "would not give a brass tuppence for the House of Lords." His Lordship should have a care, or he will be indicted for high treason when he returns home.

At a base ball match this week in Winnipeg two players, Greenway and Walton quarrelled, when the former stabbed the latter in the breast and stomach eleven times, and it is not likely Walton will recover. Greenway has been arrested and jailed.

as the growing needs of the country demanded. The commission upon which they were now engaged was open to receive the opinions and complaints of all classes of people. The agricultural and labouring as well as the manufacturing mercantile sections of the communities visited might send their delegates, and be sure of a respectful and considerate hearing, but of course when it comes to rearranging the tariff, other considerations will govern the conduct of the party, and it is more than probable that a very great deal of weight will be given to the opinions of the manufacturing delegates, while those of the remaining classes will be relegated to a subordinate place. Mr. Foster will probably visit Fredericton, and be banqueted here as well, and rumors even go so far as to say that he will contest York County in the coming Dominion election.

IMMIGRATION.

The Manitoba Government and the C. P. R. Company are about to withdraw their agencies established at Moncton for the purpose of promoting migration and diverting immigration away from the Eastern States of the union and sending it to Manitoba and the Northwest territories. Mr. Ham and Mr. Haslam of the C. P. R. will remove to St. John from which point they will operate in the future, and Mr. Nelson of the Manitoba government will abandon the field altogether. The Daily Transcript says:—"The opposition by the press to an organized effort to induce migration from this section is in no little degree responsible for the announcement. The agents also discover that the migrating class prefer the new England States as a field of labor because of nearness to their former homes and the larger population affording increased opportunities for employment."
