FRANK ALMY HANGED.

A Bumbling Execution—The Crime. CONCORD, N. H., May 16.—George H. Abbott, alias Frank C. Almy, the murderer of Christie Warden, was hanged here at 10.14 a. m.

The execution was a bungling job. His feet touched the floor when he went through the drop, and he was strangled to death. At five o'clock this morning he rose and after cheerily greeting the watch, dressed himself, smoked a cigar, seeming to enjoy it greatly.
