### FRANK ALMY HANGED.

A Bungling Execution-The Crime. CONCORD, N. H., May 16.—George H. Abbott, alias Frank C. Almy, the murderer of

Christie Warden, was hanged here at 10.14

The execution was a bungling job. His feet touched the floor when he went through the drop, and he was strangled to death. At five o'clock this morning he rose and after cheerily greeting the watch, dressed himself smoked a cigar, seeming to enjey it greatly, Then he read for a while. He ate heartily Chaplain Wilkins went to the prison earl and he was with Almy until the end. large number of citizens came from Hanover on the early morning train to witness the hanging, among them being Bert Warden, a brother of the murdered girl, and C.
