### AGRICULTURE

Notes and Suggestions of Practical Utility  
FOR THE FARM, FIELD, GARDEN AND DAIRY.  
Cleanings of Interest for Our Country Readers.

**How to Keep Cut Hoses from Opening Too Fast.**  
Wrap them separately in wet tissue paper and keep it constantly wet. In this way flowers purchased the day before or early in the morning will be kept as bought until needed.

**How to Make Excellent Cologne.**  
Into one pint of spirits of wine put half an ounce of champhor, two drams of ambergris, six drams of oil of lavender, two drams of oil of civet and six drams of oil of bergamot. Cork up tight and shake every morning and night for a couple of weeks. Then filter, and it is ready for use.

**How to Clean Marble.**  
Mix fine pumice stone, newly slacked lime and verdigris with soft soap and rub the stains one way with a woollen rag. Wash off with soap and water.

**How to Clean all Kinds of Metal.**  
Wet a woollen rag in a mixture composed of half a pint of refined neatfoot oil and half a gill of turpentine; dip in powdered rotten stone and rub the metal briskly. Wipe with a soft cloth and polish with dry leather.

**How to See up a Chimney.**  
Place a piece of mirror in the stovepipe hole at an angle of 45 degs. If the light of the sky is visible, so also will be the interior of the chimney.

**How to Gold Lacquer.**  
Three ounces of seedlac, one ounce of turmeric, one-quarter ounce of dragon's blood and a pint of alcohol; let it stand for a week, shake frequently, decant and filter.

**How to Weld Copper.**  
Heat the copper to a red heat and scatter over it powdered salt of phosphorus. Next heat to a cherry red and hammer together.
