In Leave your wife as free to act as you are short, the export of cheese per se improverishes land; the export of butter leaves the land just as it found it. Take this as an example: The export of cheese from Cheshire nearly ruined the farmers of that county; Epping and the Vale of Aylesbury have exported butter for centuries and the grass continues to flourish as well as, or better than ever.

At a farmers' institute meeting in Wisconsin, Mr. C. P. Goodrich said: A fullration for a dairy cow in full flow is all she can eat. How can I use a little more feed, not a little less. There are three things to watch carefully at all times, The cow when she is eating, to see it her appetite is good; the excrement, to see if her digestion is good, and the milk pail, to see if the profit is good. A scientific ration must be submitted to the cow for her to pass judgment upon. The ration which he had used successfully per day per cow was as follows: Ensilage, 32lbs.; clover hay. 5lbs,; corn stubble, 5lbs.; oat straw, 2bls.; wheat bran, 8lbs.; and cotton seed meal. cost of 12 cents. This he fed to 25 cows, and when he changed to cotton seed meal he found his butter increased 21bs. a day thereby. Make two frames of tough, hard wood to fit on the cow's neck, one near her head and the other about fourteen inches further back. Connect these frames by four strong rounds, two on each side. The simplest way to do this is to bore holes the size of the rounds in the frames and after entering the ends of the rounds fastened by means of screws. The frames may be fastened together the same way. A cow with this rig on cannot bend her neck short enough to reach her teats with her mouth and the frames will not interfere with her eating whether out of a manager or grazing. The length of the rounds must be governed by the length of the cow's neck; a very long necked cow requiring longer rounds than one with a short neck.

PAYMENT IN GOLD WILL BE CONTINUED BY THE U.

S. TREASURY.

The Silver Certificates at a Discount at Halifax.

President Cleveland Makes a Statement About Gold Payments.

The Boston Herald publishes a statement made to a representative of the United Press in which the President said :

"The inclination on the part of the public to accept newspaper reports concerning the intentions of those charged with the management of our finances seem to justify my emphatic contradiction of the statement that the redemption of any kind of treasury notes, except in gold, has at any time been determined upon or contemplated by the secretary of the treasury, or any other member of the present administration. The President and his cabinet are absolutely harmonious in the determination to exercise every power conferred upon them to maintain the public credit, to keep the public faith, and preserve the parity between gold and silver and between all financial obligations of the government.

"While the law of 1890, forcing the purchase of a fixed amount of silver every month provides that the secretary of the treasury, in his discretion, may redeem in either gold or silver the treasury notes given in payments of silver purchases, yet the declaration of the policy of the government to maintain the parity between the two metals seems so clearly to regulate this discretion as to dictate their redemption in gold.

"Of course, perplexity and difficulties have grown out of an unfortunate financial policy which we found in vogue and embarrassments have arisen from ill-advised financial legislation confronting us at every turn; but with cheerful confidence among the people, and a patriotic disposition to co-operate, threatened dangers will be averted pending a legislative return to a better and sounder financial plan. "The stronger credit of the country, still

unimpaired, and the good sense of our people, which has never failed in time of need, are at hand to save us from disaster." If this report of the president's declaration

regarding the treasury notes can be taken as true to the letter, it will go a long way in reassuring the public mind. Nothing could be more positive and satisfactory than the statement of policy made in the above dispatch. There is no room for misunderstanding it. The pledge ss absolute and unequivocal. One other point. It will be noticed that the report denies that the secretary of the treasury has at any time contemplated the abandonment of gold payments on these notes. If that be so Mr. Carlisle was very unfortunate in the wording of his policy at the "authorized interview" published last week. The language which he used on that occasion -to put the best possible construction upon it-left his intentions gravely open to doubt; and it was widely interpreted as meaning that he would discontinue gold payments on the notes as soon as the reserve dropped below the \$100,000,000 line.
