THE LEGISLATURE. The Provincial Legislature has complet ed the third week of its legislative duties and the major part of the work of the session may be said to be already accomplished. The session has been comparatively uneventful in many ways, and the speech making, owing to the lack of interesting and exciting public questions to arouse the enthusiasm of the members, has been somewhat below the average. It is true that some very good speeches were made on the Atkinson petition, one of the best being that delivered by Mr. Dibblee in defence of his election. The legislature very quickly disposed of Dr. Atkinson's grievance The Attorney General pointed out that the doctor had a remedy in thecourts of law, apart from his right to appeal to the legislature. But in case he took his case to the courts, he would, in case he failed.

the costs. There was also a very lively debate Thursday afternoon and evening on the stumpage and lumber resolutions. Th Surveyor General introduced the subject calling attention to the report of the lumber commission appointed two years ago, and to the fact that the present 10 year leases of the Crown Lumber Lands would soon expire, and it would be necessary to pass legislation limiting the duration of the new leases and regulating the conditions under which they are to be granted. He was followed by the Attorney General, who intimated that the government was in favour of extend ing the time of duration of the lumber leases, in order to render the tenure of the lessees as permanent as possible, a fact which would tend to make them more caref labout the protection of the lands leased, from fire, and would almost entirely prevent the cutting of undersized lumber. The government also proposed to guard against combines being formed, and the revenue from lumber lands becoming depreciated, by inserting in each lease a covenant binding the lessees to cut an average annual percentage of lumber on the ground leased, as well as a condition providing that the Lieutenant Governor in council may increase the rate of milage and stumpage during the continuance of the lease.




