Changes in Mail Routes.

Inspector Colter has made arrangements whereby Richmond Corner and Woodstock Road Station will get their mail in the afternoon after the express comes in. Hartford, Wakefield Centre Lindsay, Bloomfield, Brookville will now get three mails a week instead of two as formerly. Good's Corner, Pioneer and Long Settlement will now get three mails a week instead of two and will be served from Centreville instead of from Woodstock. Royalton and Boundry Line will get three mails instead of two and will be served in the afternoon after the arrival of the express mail. Knoxford and Greenfield will get three mails instead of two and will be served in the afternoon. Tracy's Mills will have a daily mail. Charleston and St. Thomas will be served from Avondale instead of from Middle Simonds. Cloverdale in a short time will have two mails instead of one. All these advantageous changes have been made with not only no extra expense but with a saving of \$250.—Dispatch.
