

Liberal Meeting at Bath.

Tuesday 14th inst. was the date announced by posters for a great Liberal conclave at Bath. It was announced on the program that an organization meeting would be held in the afternoon and a regular Liberal meeting in the evening, but some of our favorite newspapers had advertised differently, stating that Johnville was to have the night's meeting. This mistake with a misunderstanding on the part of C. J. Milligan and H. H. McCain, M. P. P. concerning the afternoon meeting almost sufficed to abort the primary object of the Liberals of Kent Front. However, although the afternoon meeting failed to assemble, the evening meeting was fairly well attended, and organization was accomplished and a number of excellent speeches were made in defence of and to the benefit of the Liberals at large.

Chas. E. Gallagher was appointed to the chair and after Mr. Milligan had given his instructions as to what was the requisite for the proceedings of organization. A nominating committee of three including Samuel Barker, Jas. Squires and C. Tompkins were selected and after a short deliberation the following permanent officers were chosen: C. E. Gallagher, chairman, Dr. Commins, Sec'y, C. Tompkins John Kinney, J. C. Squires, Dr. Atkinson, C. E. McLean, committee.

H. H. McCain was present and made a very neat address. He apologized for not being present in the afternoon, but he thought the Woodstock people from whom he got his information were responsible. He also claimed that he did not feel disappointed himself because he was always meeting with disappointments and had learned to take them stoically. He was glad that the Liberals were in power, provincially and federally. He thought that the Liberal leaders of the present day were not only strictly honest but incorruptible. He admitted that Mr. Ha'e was a strong man and a good man, but that the next federal election he will be out of politics. He eulogized Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his cabinet, but thought that provincial legislation could be better carried out by the present form of government, i. e., a coalition government. He also eulogized Emerson and exonerated him from the fault of causing the present hard times. Emerson could not control the rust of the potatoes, wheat and oats. Neither could he afford to buy these nor command the United States to open her markets to our lumber.

Chas. Appleby of the Woodstock Dispatch, was the next speaker called

Patrick O'Neill of Holmesville, was called upon for a speech and responded with a very clever argument in favor of the present government. He believes that St. John as a winter port has been a great boon for New Brunswick, and especially so for Carleton County. He also complained that certain Conservative promises, especially one which promised to cloud the sky along the St. John river with the smoke of every kind of factory, were never executed; but since the present Liberal regime factories have been established which have greatly benefited the farmers here,

but were never dreamed of by the conservative government.

Dr. Commins was also called upon for a speech but cleverly got out of the scrape.

C. J. Milligan was next on the platform and he spoke excellently, and was given a rousing reception. He prophesied victory for the Liberals in the next election, and altogether proved himself a clever orator and a very keen debater.
